The Latest News of the City and Province.

THE special mail train arrived in the city from Cape Traverse at 2.50 p. m., Saturday.

MRS. VAIL was "at home" to a large number of lady friends at the American Consulate on Friday afternoon.

MR. A. E. GOLDING, a St. John newspaper man, who has been in the city for the past two weeks, left by Saturday's afternoon western train for Summerside.

MR. BLANCHARD DODGE was a passenger by the Capes route on Saturday. He was summoned to Halifax by a telegram announcing the sudden death of his father, Dr. Dodge, which was referred to on Saturday.

At the horse races which took place on the Hillsborough ice Saturday afternoon, Mr. Henry Hooper's "Joe Murphy," took first place, Mr. B. C. Prowse's "Barney C," second and Mr. L. J. Sentner's third.

PETER GILLIS, of Selkirk Road, Lot 60, died of pneumonia, on the 20th day of January, 1899, at the age of 44 years. He was considered one of the strongest men in the county and never known to be sick until this pneumonia laid him aside which proved fatal in a few days. Mr. Gillis was a kind hearted man, a good and obliging neighbor, always ready to give a helping hand to anyone who required his assistance. His brothers and sisters have the deepest sympathy of the immediate neighbors and friends everywhere.—Com.

THE pulpit of the First Methodist church was occupied in the morning by Rev. Mr. Sutcliffe, who took for his text, Ac's 1-26, and in the evening by Rev. Dr. Williams, who delivered an able discourse on "Unselfishness" from Isaiah 55. 10-11 in which he vividly presented to his many hearers the duty of man to use the gifts of God for the benefit of others and not to live for self alone, showing that as nature gives us wondrous gifts and as in sowing seed we reap a multiplied reproduction, so spiritually the kindness and assistance we bestow upon our fellow man shall be abundantly returned to us in blessings. Rev. Dr. Williams is here in the interests of St. James' church, Montreal, which is in financial difficulties caused by the congregation of the older St. James' church, in furthering Methodism in that city by branching out into two other churches and in building a new St. James', incurred the debt to such an extremely burdensome amount that it was found necessary to appeal to the Methodists throughout Canada for assistance. This matter he described in detail in both churches and called upon the congregations for help to which they responded very liberally. Dr. Williams has kindly consented to preach in the First Methodist church again this evening. Prof. Watts, the reorganized choir and the organ furnished excellent music at these services.

It is with sincere regret that we chronicle today the death of Mr. John Smith of Kelly's Cross, which occurred at the Charlottetown Hospital at 8 o'clock Sunday morning. Mr. Smith had been ailing for some time past and during the past fortnight he underwent treatment under competent physicians at the city Hospital with the above sad result. He was about 41 years of age and leaves a disconsolate wife and a large family to mourn his untimely end. His remains will be conveyed this morning to his home in Maplewood, Lot 29, and from his late residence to St. Joseph's Church, Kelly's Cross, on Tuesday morning at 9.30 a. m.

THE services in Grace Church yesterday were well attended and of quite an impressive and helpful character. Dr. Williams of St. James' Church, Montreal, preached in the morning from I Kings 19: 15-20.
