THE PROHIBITION ACT.

In another column will be found a letter advising a reference of the P. Island Prohibitory law to the Supreme Court of Canada with a view to testing its validity before it comes into operation on 5th June next. It may be asked, Why question the validity of the Act as it is? Why not permit it to go into operation and have its validity tested in the cases of violation which may arise under the Act? In reply to these questions it may be pointed out that the virtual abrogation of the Manitoba Prohibition Act has thrown such doubt into the public mind that many persons have, without sufficient reason, rushed to the conclusion that our Act is also unconstitutional. It is quite possible that a reference to the Court would establish the fact that the law shortly to come into effect here is in every respect valid, in which case it would be an excellent thing to have the fact known and declared beforehand. Such a decision would no doubt greatly strengthen the public opinion behind the law, and would doubtless tend in some measure to prevent violation of its provisions, and also prevent much costly litigation.

On the other hand should it turn out that the law or any section of it is unconstitutional it would be the better for all concerned that the fact should be known as speedily as possible. It might be that a defect would be found by the Court which could be cured by amendment at the coming session of the Legislature before the Act comes into operation. Or, if the Act should be found incapable of amendment within the powers of the Legislature, so as to be an operative and effective statute, it could be repealed and other provisions made for the regulation of the liquor traffic instead of prohibition.

We have not yet seen the decision of the Manitoba Judges by which the act of their Province is declared ultra vires, and cannot therefore know how far that decision may bear upon our own Act. But we do know the conditions in the two Provinces differ in important respects. For instance, the Hudson's Bay Company have certain chartered rights in Manitoba derived from Imperial legislation which are thought to conflict with prohibition in that Province. The two Acts also differ in material provisions and penalties and hence it is quite possible that our Act might be held to be in all respects valid notwithstanding that the Manitoba Act has failed.

We think it desirable to have the matter settled in an authoritative way as speedily as possible.

Since the above was in type we have received the Toronto Globe containing an abstract of the deliberance of the Manitoba Judges. They hold in brief that the entire Act is ultra vires, the various provisions being so connected that they cannot be separated. The Globe concludes that as the result of the decision "the operation of both the Manitoba and P. E. Island prohibitory laws will be suspended." It adds that there will no doubt be an appeal from the judgment. If such an appeal is carried to the Privy Council it may be hoped that a decision will be reached which will more clearly define the powers of the Provinces in regard to this most important matter.

In the latest annual report of the Chief Analyst at Ottawa on the adulteration of food, it is stated that "over 70 per cent of the baking powders sold in Canada contain alum." The Analyst adds that he recommended that five of the parties supplying adulterated baking powders be prosecuted, and that although this was not done, it would be quite possible to obtain a judgement against the use of alum.

There ought to be a large attendance at the concert this evening in aid of the Monument Fund. Preparations have been made, and a musical program prepared which promises to be of a very high class. The worthy object of the entertainment ought also to appeal strongly to our loyal citizens whose favor for the Fund is unquestionable. Every dollar added to the fund will add so much to the size and beauty of the Monument.

Since 1896 there have been twenty-four deaths and two resignations among the members of the Canadian Senate. This makes the present standing of parties forty-seven Conservatives and thirty-four Liberals, having a Conservative majority of thirteen. Senator Poirer of New Brunswick is in this calculation included among the Conservatives, but is reported now to desire to give an independent support to the Laurier Government. Should he do so the real majority would be eleven. Thus the strength of parties in the Red Chamber is rapidly being equalised.

It will be remembered that 1,000 Canadians going to South Africa were insured against accidents to the amount of \$1,000 for every one killed, with less sums for maiming in various forms. The insurance was affected by Sir Charles Tupper at the cost of a friend whom he was not at liberty to name. The Toronto Star says that it is now understood that the premiums paid amounted to \$20,000, and that Mr. Hugh Graham of Montreal is believed to be the friend who paid the money. Whoever it was he did a generous and patriotic thing. It turns out also that the insurance company which took the risk lost some \$11,000, the casualties being much greater than had been expected.
