LONDON, June 13.—Rear-Admiral William S. Sims made no direct mention of United States residents in sympathy with the Irish republican cause today during a forty minute address at a luncheon given in his honor by the United States Luncheon Club.

J. P. R. Conference On Wages June 17

Brotherhoods Notified to Send Representatives to Montreal

TORONTO, June 13.—Railway circles were stirred by news that the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen had been notified by the C. P. R. to send representatives to a conference in Montreal on Friday, June 17.

The system from St. John to Vancouver will be represented, and it is said that Grant Hall, vice-president, will represent the company. Members of the Brotherhood might be expected to be taking this way of stating the company's viewpoint on the present railway situation in Canada.

It is not expected that any definite scheme for a reduction in wages or rules will actually be broached until after July 1, when the United States Labor Board "officially" make their award known to the meeting of Brotherhood chairman in Chicago.
