Tommy Gorman Takes On New Sporting Venture

OTTAWA, Jan. 20 (CP)—Versatile Tommy Gorman, who operates diverse sports interests with the Ottawa Senators, has added another venture to his string. Along with his operations in big-time hockey and horse-racing, the veteran impresario of many a big-office has just become a full-fledged professional baseball magnate. For Tommy, it's a return to a game he's had no connections with for 23 years, but he's as wildly enthusiastic over his new Ottawa entry in the class "C" border league as though he'd been waiting to do just this for all of his life. "Best little sports town in North America right here," he enthused today, "and a good ball team is just what it needs." Tommy should know, for he's had since 1911 to muse on the prospects of baseball in this capital city. That year the future magnate, then a newspaper reporter, went in with Shag Shaughnessy—now president of the International Ball League—and Malcolm Brice, a sports editor, on the management of the professional Ottawa Senators. The team folded at the outbreak of war in 1914, and later Tommy moved in on hockey, parlaying a combination of showmanship and business acumen into one of the major sports interests in the country. At present, he owns and operates Comnought Park here, one of the Dominion's big hockey tracks, and he's president and managing director of the Ottawa Forum, Ltd., which operates a variety of projects including the Senators, leading club of the Quebec Senior Hockey League. Before landing back in Ottawa, Tommy had several years in professional hockey, managing Chicago and Montreal Maroons to Stanley Cup titles and later operating the Forum, home of Montreal Canadiens.

Montreal Man Signs To Manage Cincinnati Garden

CINCINNATI, Jan. 20 (AP)—Frank J. Selke of Montreal, today was signed to a 10-year contract as general manager of the Cincinnati Garden, Inc., holder of an American Hockey League franchise. Charles Sawyer, Cincinnati lawyer and president of the franchise, said Selke would divide his time between Montreal and Cincinnati until a \$2,000,000 sports arena is completed here in time for the 1948-49 winter sports season. Selke, affiliated with Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens for 20 years, now is serving as general manager of the Montreal Forum, which owns the Canadiens of the National Hockey League. The construction of the Cincinnati garden arena, designed to seat some 10,000 persons, is expected to be started this summer.

Medynski Leads Big Four Scoring

HALIFAX, Jan. 20—II scoring points were years, Lou Medynski of Truro Bearcats could soon post his 100th goal in the Maritime Big Four Hockey League. The 26-year-old forward, who has rounded the 60 mark and holding first place position in the league's scoring race, has 64 points in 30 games. Two St. Mike's Players Suspended

TORONTO, Jan. 20—Suspension of two key players from the pace-setting Toronto St. Michael's College team of the Ontario Hockey Association's junior "A" group for poor academic standings emphasized today that school authorities insist hockey players should pay as much attention to their scholastic work as to their puck-chasing efforts. The players, forwards Fleming Mackell and Ray Hannigan, were suspended last Thursday, but it was not learned officially until today when a club official confirmed rumors that started when the collegians defeated Toronto Young Rangers 6-1 here Saturday with Mackell, the leading scorer in the 10-team league, missing from the lineup. Hannigan's suspension was lifted in time for him to play against Young Rangers but in the case of Mackell, a future prospect of the National Hockey League Toronto Maple Leafs, the situation was somewhat different. He had been warned before that he must "buckle down" in classes. Since the time the suspension went into effect authorities have discussed the matter again with Mackell and it is believed that the starchy player has decided to take his school work more seriously. A club official said he expected that Mackell, a fourth year high school student, would be reinstated.
