Britain Gets Mosul

(Canadian Press.) GENEVA, Dec. 16.—The League

of Nations Council made public today the official decision in favor of Britain over the Mosul area of Northern Mesopotamia. As forecast it awards Mosul to British mandate and the State of Iraq on condition that Great Britain submit a new treaty with Iraq for a twenty-five year mandate, with the stipulation that the mandate may terminate earlier, should Iraq enter the League before that period expires.

ISLANDERS NARROW ESCAPE.—The following clipping from the Baltimore Sun referring to Dr. John P. Bell, a native of this city, will be of interest. Two men were rescued from drowning in the harbor near Spring Gardens yesterday when the speedboat Mr. Groco II, capsized in a trial trip from the headquarters of the Maryland Yacht Club. A Roy Gross, owner of the boat, and Dr. J. P. Bell, occupants of the craft, were rescued from the water by Capt. Carl T. Hatch, owner of the auxiliary yawl, Veteran, which put out from the club house when the plight of the men was learned. Later the speedboat was raised by the crew of the Veteran. Slight damage had been done. It was said while the Mr. Groco II was being hauled to the surface, dry clothing and first-aid treatment were given Mr. Gross and Dr. Bell on board the Veteran. Neither suffered ill effects, although they were in the water some time, it was said. The Mr. Groco II has been entered by Mr. Gross in races to be held at Pointe-a-la-Peine, Fla., in February. 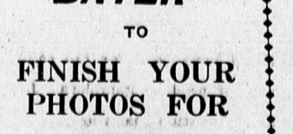
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"Rusty" Crawford A veteran of many hockey seasons
