Madam Regent and Ladies: Considerable business has been transacted by the Provincial Educational branch of your Order since our last Annual Meeting.

The War Memorial Committee of Selection awarded the Overseas Post-Graduate Scholarship for 1929-30 to Robert B. Messervy, B. A., of Charlottetown. Mr. Messervy who is a graduate of Toronto University and who has already had some work at a British University is at present in Canada. He will take up his post-graduate work at Oxford in the autumn.

The Bursary for 1929 was awarded to Miss Marie Clarke, daughter of William Jesse Clarke of Charlottetown, a totally disabled veteran of Gallipoli. Miss Clarke is at present taking the first year of her university course at Prince of Wales College and will continue her studies at one of the Maritime Universities next fall.

Queen Square School: Gerard McKinnon and Frances MacMillan were the two successful students, the prizes were presented by Mrs. J. S. Morris and Mrs. A. A. Bartlett.

In West Kent School the successful ones were Allison Rogers and Esther Rattenbury. The prizes were presented by Mrs. Brehaut and Mrs. H. Bethune.

A portrait of His Majesty, King George V. has been framed and presented by the chapter to the Legislative Building.

The patriotic days during the year have been observed in the following way: Paardeberg Day, a wreath placed on the monument; St. Georges Day was not marked in any special way, owing to the death of a prominent patriotic citizen; Empire and Victoria Day was as usual observed by the selling of Alexandra Roses; Trafalgar Day by a sale of useful and fancy articles, fashioned by the clever fingers of some of the daughters during the year, supplemented by a household table, both of which helped to fill the treasury to the full.

Madam Regent and Ladies:—In reporting for the Chapter on the League of Nations I may say that I have no local activities to report, as no campaign for membership has so far been undertaken here.

A monthly review called "Interdependence" has been sent us regularly by the League of Nations Society in Canada, but it has not yet been made use of as a medium for study in the meetings.

The advisory officer of the League Dr. W. A. Riddell is now visiting Canada and will travel from coast to coast. His visit is to stimulate a general interest in the work, with a view to securing memberships in The Canadian branch of the organization.

All of you who had the privilege of hearing the splendid and intensive lecture of Sir Herbert Ames last summer could not fail to have absorbed a full knowledge of the aims and workings of the League.

During 1927 Canada was honored by being elected to a seat on the Council and our Prime Minister, the Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King appointed a delegate to Geneva. This meant much for Canada and would doubtless be the means of Canadians on the whole taking a greater interest in League affairs. Special importance attaches to Canada in the League, as being, in the absence of the United States, the only representative in it from North America. The Prime Minister declares that the

The two travelling libraries awarded to this Province from the Head Office, are at present in the schools at Brackley Point and at Harrington. The libraries will be exchanged early in April, thus giving each school the benefit of both sets of books.

This year two hundred (200) patriotic calendars were secured for this Province, the Abegweit Chapter taking fifty (50) and the Royal Edward Chapter one hundred and fifty (150).

The customary publicity was given to the Short Story, One-Act Plays and Christmas Card contests, which were conducted as usual by the Head Office. Miss Turner's prize-winning Christmas Card in last year's contest was on sale by both Chapters and was very much admired and proved a ready seller.

results from his representation there are largely due to the fact that he felt that he had the whole of Canada at his back in the desire for world peace. This participation of Canada will no doubt be the means of developing a greater national spirit and augurs well for the future.

We are now in the 10th year of the League. In 1920 the organization had few friends, many avowed enemies, a host of critics and it faced an apathetic and cynical public.

Today it is recognized as a permanent institution and is receiving the loyal support of 55 out of the 63 nations of the world, and enjoying the respect and partial co-operation of most of the eight not included in its membership.

Sir George Foster (only lately resigned), President of the League of Nations Society for Canada, says that "all that is needed to achieve permanent peace is the continued support by individual men and women in every nation of the principles of the League and their organized effort to enforce consideration of their proposals upon their respective governments."

Through its instrumentality aggressive warfare is condemned as a crime against humanity by the combined nations of the world.

The Prime Minister expressed the following sentiment recently in a public address in Ottawa, "Should the League of Nations fail, that failure must be placed at the door of the Christian Church, rather than at the door of Parliament."

Our own Canon Scott and beloved padre in the war, gives us the following verses called "Armistice" which are appropriate here:

ARMISTICE

Over the broken dead,
Over the trenches and wire,
Bugles of God rang out—
"Cease fire."
Woe to those nations of men
Who, in their heat or desire,
Break that stern order of God—
"Cease fire."
