**Chamberlain Goes Home a Missionary From This Country**

WINNIPEG, Oct. 13.—"I am going back to England," said Neville Chamberlain when he chatted with the Free Press on the Canadian Pacific Railway platform Sunday evening, "a missionary from Canada." Mr. Chamberlain is a British member of Parliament who has been touring this country as a guest of the Montreal Board of Trade. It is his first visit, but as the son of his father, the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, he says he has long looked forward to the time when he might see for himself one of those overseas Dominions, of the importance of which Joseph Chamberlain had always been insistent when looking to the future state of the British Empire. Neville Chamberlain is going back a missionary from Canada, because, as he says, "there is no reason why you should not get the pick of our people to come to you. They are not coming because you are not asking them to come. Others are asking them and so are getting them. In my opinion you are ad-

**SERIOUS DETRIMENT.**

"The loneliness resulting from the present system of settlement working larger tracts than can be handled advantageously and profitably would appear to me to be a serious detriment to the immigrant, and be very uneconomical. You have so much to offer in Canada, though," asserted Mr. Chamberlain "that you should not have any difficulty in getting the right kind of people to come in. But you are not telling them what you have. They don't know, and no means seems to be taken to tell them. They hear plenty about what the other Dominions have to offer; they hear nothing about Canada. A very extensive and penetrating propaganda seems to be effected by other overseas Dominions, but Canada seems to remain silent. For my own part, I go back to England a missionary from Canada. I have seen the country with the peculiar interest of one who had heard much about it, through my father. I can pay tribute to that wise foresight which led him years ago to insist upon the emphasis of the vast future and great importance which would accrue to the British colonies, as they were then regarded, or to the overseas Dominions as they are today."

Mr. Chamberlain is accompanied by Mrs. Chamberlain. They spent an hour last evening during the stop over of the Canadian Pacific train, which brought them from the west. After paying some visits to Toronto they expect to return to England.

"I was most impressed in British Columbia, with the tremendous outlook for Vancouver as a seaport. It must become one of the great ports of the continent. With smaller holdings, there would be more intensive cultivation, a constant rotation of work and sources which would permit of revenue coming in over a much greater part of the year than is obtainable through dependence upon one grain crop. There would be less loneliness, for settlers would be comprised within more settled communities.


