ELI MINATE THE FAKIR

A Winnipeg news item, in connection with the recent discovery of oil in that vicinity, says, "there will be no Calgary oil stocks of the wildcat or speculative kind sold in Manitoba, Judge Robson, Public Utilities Commissioner, has refused stock brokers who rushed down from Calgary permission to sell stocks in this province. His sole aim is to protect the public. No Calgary oil stock of any kind will be sold in Manitoba until the Corporations who wish to place it on the market satisfy Judge Robson that the stock is for a bona fide well. In addition they must submit a financial statement showing that the proposition is on a sound basis."

Promotion and development schemes have ever been fruitful sources of temptation. The possibilities of large and profitable sales of "water," which costs little or nothing, along with the more material product, which is worth its face value, are irresistible to the man who sets out to "make money anyway." As a result fakirs usually infest the grounds on which promotions, otherwise legitimate and beneficial, are being effected, the innocent are fleeced and the legitimate and beneficial schemes are discredited.

The Province of Manitoba is acting wisely in placing safeguards around its new found wealth. The oil wells are no doubt rich, will no doubt bring wealth to individuals and to the province. If it is understood abroad that the wildcat speculator is to be rigidly excluded, there will be no lack of investors, for oil propositions are usually remunerative. If, on the other hand, the wildcat speculator gets his hand in, the business will be seriously injured, many will be robbed and many others who would gladly have shared in the bonanza will give it a wide berth.

This is true of all promotions, not excluding the fox industry in our own province, a business which, hitherto, has had perhaps the cleanest record, both in the matter of financial success and the character of its promotion, of any industry in modern times. Yet it must not be forgotten that it, too, has its temptations and that the fakir still lives. He may get into the fox business; he may have already got into it, and there are suspicions that he has. We are pleased to learn that the Fox Breeders' Association is investigating certain promotions whose bonanzas are not perfectly apparent. Should clear cases of intentional fraud be discovered it will be the duty of the Association to place the matter at once in the hands of the Attorney General and this, we understand, they are determined to do.

NEWFOUNDLAND SUFFERERS

As noted in Saturday's Guardian, the lists are now open for contributions to the relief fund for the widows and orphans of the victims of the terrible disaster in the Newfoundland seal fisheries last April, the details of which are still fresh in the minds of our readers.

It is unnecessary to recall the harrowing details. Suffice it is to say that over a hundred persons, widows and orphans, many of them at the time of their calamity with little or nothing in store for the future, were suddenly bereft of their breadwinners. Their condition, necessarily, was pitiful. Immediate help was needed and to the credit of our country and our civilization, help came. The Dominion Government made a liberal contribution; later it added to the original amount; contributions came from Great Britain; a number of the Canadian provinces contributed. The sorrow of the unfortunates was made less acute, by the fact that hunger and immediate need were, at least, temporarily removed. But still there is want, and it will continue for many years.

Prince Edward Island has not yet shared in this aid. It is our privilege as well as our duty to do it now. It was the Master Himself who said "inasmuch as ye have done unto the least of these, my brethren we have done it unto me;" "inasmuch as we have done it not to these we have done it not to me." In this province of ours where the great majority—if not all—profess to be followers of Him, where poverty and destitution are unknown, where all are comfortably circumstanced and many well off, it should not be too much to expect that a generous contribution to this worthy object shall be made. Let our people who have prospered remember the unfortunate, and let the contribution from the Island be in keeping with its boast that it is the wealthiest province per head in the Dominion. We owe it to ourselves as well as to our unfortunate neighbors to extend a helping hand. We trust that no time will be lost in completing the lists and that there will be a generous response from all over the province.

However, instead of giving that assistance, we have the humiliation of putting a stumbling block in their way. The same item goes on to say "Mr. Murray said that he was opposed to the amendment. He took the ground that prohibition would make conditions worse in Halifax."

R.R. ECCENTRICITIES

Sir.—A change for the better, is always agreeable, but when the change is of an opposite nature there is reason to kick. For years this place had a post office which gave excellent service, no complaints, no fault-finding. Sometime last December that institution was closed and boxes came into use. For a week or two His Majesty's mail was a mystery (bungle), the mails for one settlement finding its way to another, in a few instances coming after several days. People forgave a great deal, and one heard the remark—"Oh the papers always go wrong for a few weeks at first, but they'll come to it later." The fact of the mails going wrong any time means their being handled by incompetent persons, who fail to recognize the importance of the position they hold.

About two weeks ago, meeting two neighbors, I asked one of them—"Anything good in the P. E. I. Guardian today?"—mine failed to keep its appointment. "I got none either," was the reply. Then the other spoke up—"That's a complaint all through the district people not getting their papers. The fault is at Clyde River where the papers are sorted."

Three days later no Guardian came and I began to think that when one paid for a box, together with all charges the service was extremely inferior. There was always an occasional miss, but two or three days I considered more than abundant. The Courier is the same as when the service was faultless, the distance between Clyde River and Churchill is less than six miles. What became of the papers? The Courier has always given excellent service, often with roads next to impossible and weather at zero, performing his trips when none else would face the conditions.

Of seven papers that should come every week, two are dailies, the Daily Guardian and the Montreal Daily Star; about an equal number of these fail to come, but weeklies are always in evidence. On a few occasions the missing Star came perhaps a week after time, having on the wrap—"Missent to Bonshaw" or some other locality.

Hoping the Guardian will give a lift in the matter, I subscribe myself.
