SHOP-LIFTERS
 NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Mary Mauerer and Helen Demato, shop-lifters, were sentenced today in the Court of Special Sessions, by Judges Duell, McInerney and Steiner. Mary was fined \$5 and her companion was sent away for one year, which is the maximum sentence. The two were caught in a department store by Gertrude MacDonohoe, the store detective, after having stolen a large quantity of goods. One of the women carried a baby and had a large amount of dresses, coats, shirt-waists and towelings under the child's long clothes. The other had a large bundle of things which it would seem impossible to steal without detection.

Hyman Cohen, 42 years old, was also sentenced today to pay a fine for shoplifting in a department store. The activity of the store detective prevented him from getting away with much, but two boys' hats were found in his possession.

MINERS TAKE POSSESSION
 BINGHAM, Utah, September 20.—An army of miners forlorn and determinedly held undisputed possession of the copper lead and silver day of the miners' strike for a further 25 cent increase in pay and recognition of their union's demand. While the army, thousands strong and speaking many tongues, dug lines and worked out a rough form of military discipline, there was activity in the offices of the mining companies and the headquarters of the country and state officials. Developments seemed to depend almost entirely upon the success of Governor Spry, who has been asked to urge the strikers to surrender the mines to his arms and wait in patience the success or failure of the mine managers' efforts to figure out means by which their demands can be granted.

SUFFRAGETTES COMING TO CANADA
 TORONTO, Sept. 20.—The Telegram this evening says that Miss Elsie MacKenzie, of Toronto, member of the Women's Social and Political Union, has received a letter from Mrs. I. Fannin, the British Suffragist leader, explaining the nature of the campaign it is proposed to conduct in Canada. She says that Miss Barbara Wylie, who sails for Canada today, and who is a sister of a member of the Saskatchewan Legislature, will endeavor to extend and consolidate the W. S. P. U. in Canada, and conduct negotiations with the Government with a view to securing the enfranchisement of women. "Vote this session," which is the demand of the society in the Mother Country, will also be the demand in Canada.

MONTREAL RAINFALL BEATS ALL RECENT RECORDS.
 MONTREAL, September 20.—With cloudy skies today, and every prospect of further rainfall, Quebec faces the prospect of serious floods and heavy crop losses as a result of the unprecedented downfalls, which have extended over the past week. Nearly three inches of rain fell last night in the most terrific downpour the city and district has experienced for years, the deluge being greater in a few hours than is often recorded for an entire month, in the exact measure of the 3.26 inches. Entire streets were flooded, cellars in many quarters were filled with water, business was dislocated, and the streets were for hours practically deserted. The precipitation was so heavy that the sewers were quite unable to take care of the water, and it flowed in carteracts from the upper levels down the streets.

MANY FATALITIES IN THE WEST.
 WINNIPEG, Sept. 20.—A number of fatalities are reported from different parts of the West today. At Lethbridge, an Austrian section hand on the Canadian Pacific Railway, named Peter Patrick, took his life by hanging. At Arcola, Sask., Stuart Burrell, a young farm hand, whose home was in Winnipeg, drank gopher poison and his body was found in an oak field. Martha Sorenson, the two-year-old daughter of Marjorie Sorenson, of Kenora, was drowned in the lake at that place. At Fleming, Sask., a young son of C. A. Johnson was crushed to death under a farm wagon.

 (Canadian Press)
 LONDON, Sept. 21.—Colonel Sam. Hughes was a guest at a dinner given by Col. Seeley, Secretary of State for War. Col. Hughes inspected the ordnance works at Coventry.

AEROPLANES FOR CANADIAN ARMY.
 OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—As a result of the remarkable demonstration of the British Army manoeuvres this week of the indispensable part which aeroplanes play in modern warfare, it is probable that the Canadian Militia Department will soon add airplanes to the Dominion's war equipment.

Col. Hughes and his accompanying staff of militia officers intended to make a study of the use of aeroplanes, in military tactics, when they left for England last month. The phenomenally effective work of the corps of airmen in the British manoeuvres, which according to cable dispatches, rendered practically abortive the attempted strategy of the opposing generals and brought the manoeuvres to a sudden close will doubtless have the effect of convincing the Colonel and of making almost irresistible the demand for the establishment of an airship corps in connection with Canada's military defense.
