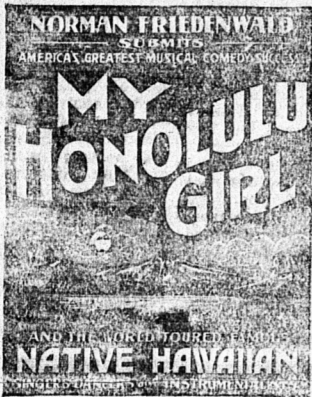

**WOUNDED MAN IMPROVING.**  
The friends of Gunner George Carver in hospital at Halifax, whose illness was previously reported will be pleased to learn that he is steadily improving. Gr. Carver who is a son of Mr. G. J. Carver of Charlottetown is suffering from the effects of a shell wound in the stomach.

**DEATH OF REV. JOSIAH WEBB.**  
The death occurred in Halifax on Saturday of Rev. Josiah Webb, a well known Baptist clergyman, of Springfield, Annapolis County, who at one time was located at O'Leary in this province. Mr. Webb went to Halifax for treatment and operation at the V. G. Hospital, but his illness proved too severe for his advanced age. He was 70 years of age and was a native of London, England. Interment was made at Springfield, N. S.

**SECOND FIRE LAST NIGHT.**  
About half an hour after the alarm for the fire on Fitzroy Street referred to elsewhere, the alarm sounded a second time for a fire at Pownall Wharf. It proved to be on a large motor houseboat in the dock owned by Wallace McDonald and which is used for towing scow-loads of sand from Holland Cove to the city for concrete making. The boat was all ablaze when the firemen arrived. A hose was laid from a hydrant at the corner of Pownall and Water Streets. A break in the coupling caused a short delay and made quite a flood of water on the wharf, but soon a couple of good streams of water put the fire out of business, but not before the house was burned off the craft. The machinery will also probably be damaged somewhat by the flames.

### Shall Canada Miss Her Chance

The reason why Canadians should support the Victory Loan 1919 from the standpoint of self-interest was never more clearly stated than in an interview with Sir John Aird, General Manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, who has recently visited France and Belgium with a view to studying Canada's trade opportunities on the spot. He discovered a splendid market not only for Canadian wheat and other cereals, Canadian meats and Canadian live-stock but for many lines of Canadian manufacture. Nevertheless while the French and the Belgians, owing to their thrift and energy, are doing much to rehabilitate themselves financially, they will for a considerable time require financial aid in the form of credits from selling countries.

This famous expert is emphatic in stating that if Canada is to get her full share of French and Belgian trade she must be prepared to extend considerable credits. Otherwise Canadian producers will be shut out of the field of present opportunities and probably shut out altogether in the future. "There is no doubt whatever," says Sir John "that the nation which captures trade by extending financial assistance now to the nation that will retain it for the future."

Here is Canada's opportunity fully stated but it will be unavailing unless every Canadian producer lends his heartiest assistance to the Victory Loan 1919 which alone will render the continuation of international credits possible.

### Sir Henry Will Take His Seat In Commons

OTTAWA, Oct. 21.—Announcement that Sir Henry Drayton had been elected by acclamation for Kingston, and that Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, the new Liberal leader, had been returned unopposed in Prince, was received with interest by members of parliament tonight. The acclamations mean that Sir Henry will be able to take his seat in the Commons within a day or two while it is quite possible that Mr. King may be able to assume the leadership of his party in the Commons before the end of the week.

With two acclamations there will be voting in six constituencies on Monday next, Quebec East, where Mr. Ernest La Pointe, who is becoming recognized as the Liberal leader from Quebec, is opposed by an Independent, is expected to elect the former member for Kamouraska. The disposition in political circles here is to concede Victoria and North Ontario to the Unionist, which, including Kingston, would give the Unionists three of the eight seats. It is thought that Gould, the Farmers' candidate, is certain of election in Assiniboit over Hon. W. R. Motherwell, and that Kennedy, the U. P. O. candidate in Glenarry, is quite likely to head the poll. Less is known here as to the situation in Carleton, N. B., where, owing to the failure of the women candidates to secure nomination, the fight lies between Caldwell, the U. P. O. candidate, and Colonel Melville, Unionist, who has but recently entered the field.

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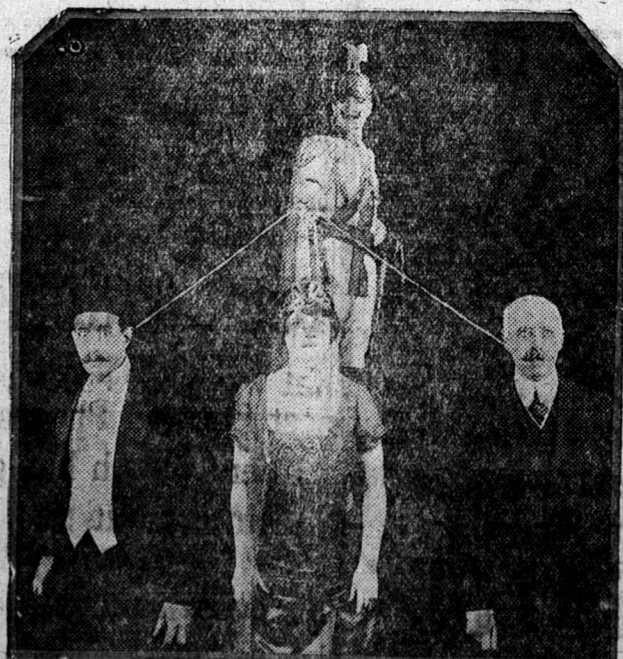
