**Australian Wheat Crop Causes Worry**

SYDNEY, N. S. W., April 23.—(By The Canadian Press Australian Correspondent):—The wheat freight market in Australia today is exceptionally bad and has reached the lowest point since before the war. The crop is below expectations, and so many ships are here to take the wheat that something approaching a freight-cutting war has begun.  
Yesterday a Norwegian motor ship after completing the discharge in Sydney of a cargo of case oil loaded in the Gulf of Mexico, continued to load a full cargo of wheat from West Australia for the United Kingdom or continent at 26 shillings and three pence a ton. That rate is the lowest quoted for years.  
At least 12 vessels secured 40 shillings a ton from Western Australia for full wheat cargoes this season, aggregating about 80,000 tons, and the majority of the season's fixtures have been at 38 shillings, ninepence, or more, with an occasional one and three-pence extra for two ports of discharge. Some weeks ago, when the freight market fell heavily owing to River Plate influences, 35 shillings and sixpence was considered a very low rate from Western Australia homeward, and an auxiliary sailing ship, which accepted thirty shillings a ton for 4,000 tons, was looked upon as having accepted a charter which meant a loss.  
The market has fallen farther still, and 28 shillings and three-pence for a steam or motor ship cargo still exceeds the limit of the most pessimistic shipping broker.  
There are more serious consequences to be faced by the regular shipping lines trading to Australia, in view of the present wheat position. The first sign of weakness in Australian wheat freights came as a result of a collapse of the River Plate markets in January. The collapse came to ship-owners as a bolt from the blue, but was forced to some extent by shippers having sent tonnage out to the River Plate without having fixed a return freight. When a large quantity of tonnage thus situated was offering to the limited number of grain charterers operating in the River Plate market, the latter, through partial spoliation of crops through rust, stamped the wheat freight market. Within a few days, the rate from San Lorenzo, for instance, to the United Kingdom, had fallen from 20 shillings to 13 and six for January-February shipments, and even May and June positions dropped from 22 to 15 immediately. This collapse had far-reaching effects, which shook shipping freights all over the world. Tonnage, finding no chance of employment in South America, has come even to Australia. One steamer was able to get a houseful of fixtures to Australia at 20 shillings a ton but has to face a losing voyage away from Australia again.  
The fall in Australian wheat freight has been accentuated by the quality of shipping which came out under charter, principally across the Pacific, relying on getting a payable rate homeward only to face a certain loss. Australian wheat-holders are almost out of the market so far as the United Kingdom and continent are concerned, owing to a drop in freight quotations; and India, South Africa and Japan are the only markets still open. Japan has absorbed a considerable tonnage of Australian wheat.

From a shipping standpoint, the outlook now is very bad. Only a small portion of the tonnage already exported this season has been taken by ships belonging to regular Australian shipping lines. Tramp tonnage has lifted most of the wheat, and tramp tonnage is now forcing the demoralization of the freight market. Apart from this, figures now available show that the regular lines will receive little or no wheat parcels during the winter months.

Usually the regular lines require 60,000 tons of wheat a month during the off season between March and September. Allowing for exports to India, South Africa and Japan, there will be practically no wheat parcels at best until August and September. The regular cargo freight market is being driven to tonnage, to which it is added a quantity of idle tonnage still left from the big strike, and reports are coming to hand daily which indicate that shipments of other classes of exports are not likely to reach expectations. A leading shipping man in Sydney said yesterday that this winter promised to be the worst on record.

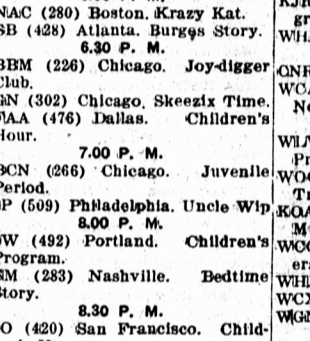
