Ultimatum in Germany

(Special to the Guardian.)
LONDON, April 18.—President Wilson in person will attend the session of Congress Wednesday and will lay before that body the American Government's stand in the controversy with Germany over submarine warfare. The summoning of a joint session was an unexpected act on the part of the President and is considered portentous. That an ultimatum will be sent to Germany or the severance of diplomatic relations will follow shortly is considered the most likely eventuality. The situation of the United States and Germany as the outgrowth of the controversy is considered graver than at any time.

TORONTO, APRIL 10th, 1915

WOOL is coming to market in fair supply. Clipping is in progress in some parts of the United States and an easier feeling prevails, buyers holding off; anticipating reduced values. The majority of Canadian Mills are working pulled and foreign wools, as the manufacturers claim they can purchase foreign wools and lay them down at their mills at a lower price than they can purchase wool at a slightly lower range of prices. Washed fleeces wool as to quality 42 to 45c per lb. Washed rejections, (burry, cotted, chaffy, etc.), 33 to 35c. Unwashed fleeces wool as to quality 30 to 32c. Northwestern unwashed according to quality 21 to 31c.

RAW FURS.
The A. & W. Nesbitt, London England sale of raw furs is in progress and prices on some varieties of fur show an advance over sales held there during the past year, but are not any higher than expected, as the prices had already been anticipated by Canadian Row Fur dealers who are paying prices for raw furs at the full proportionate advance indicated by the result of the sales.

The Canadian furs already sold in the sales resulted as follows Wolf, Bear, Red Fox, Silver Fox, Wild Cat, House Cat, Lynx, Badger and Marten sold at the same prices as in last January Sales. Cross Fox, Wolverine and Otter 20 per cent higher, White Fox 15 per cent higher, Ermine 30 per cent higher than last January Sales, while Mink was neglected. Sales of other varieties of fur continues this week. Large quantities of spring muskrats are coming to market and the outlook is for a very satisfactory catch of this article, which at the present prices will well repay the trapper for his labor.

Situation Tense
(Special to the Guardian.)
PARIS, APR. 18.—Artillery are still in progress but no material advantage in fighting is claimed by either side.
Petrograd reports the repulse of Teuton attacks in Galicia at Popovam-

ghila and the capture of large quantities of war materials. The Italians are conducting mining operations on the western top of Colderi Lana and have destroyed the Austrian position and occupied a mine crater over which fighting is now in progress. In Suggan valley the Austrians have driven the Italian from advanced positions. Else-

where along the line there have been only artillery engagements. A tense situation prevails in the British cabinet over the question of conscription with the conscriptionists vigorously attacking the ministry and a strong Parliamentary force endeavoring to sustain it. German night attacks against British positions failed.

FREDERICTON, April 17.—All the ice in the St. John River below Grand Falls is running out to-day. The ice jam at Woodstock started last night and Pokok jam is also moving to-day. The channel is clear from Grand Falls to St. John now and ice is running freely. Water is rising rapidly here and at other points along the river.
