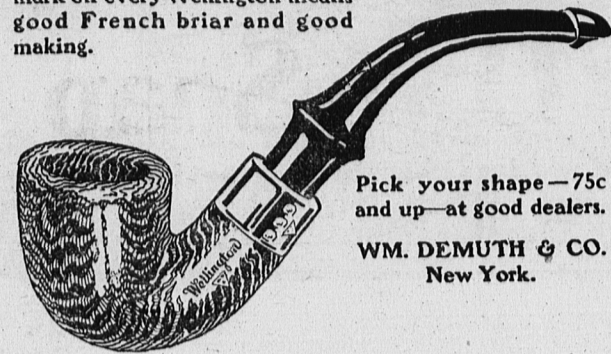

Among the passengers on the S.S. Aranmore due here this forenoon will be Bdr. F. G. Kennedy, a veteran of the 98th Siege Battery.

As a member of the famous 98th Siege (then the 2nd) Bdr. Kennedy left here under Major W. B. Prowse, almost two years ago, and since has been in all of the heavy fighting that has enabled "Prowse's Pets" to put up a record second to no other battery in the fields of France.

Bdr. Kennedy figured in the casualties near the first of January last, and was invalided to England, suffering from gas poisoning. He is a son of Mr. Alex. Kennedy, of Southport. His wife went to Pictou yesterday to meet him, and it is expected he will receive a proper reception on his arrival.

Mr. S. A. Murchison, Pinette, received the following telegram from the Director of Records, Ottawa: "Sincerely regret to inform you 712558 Pte. John Malcolm Murchison, Infantry, officially reported admitted 3rd Field Ambulance Depot, Sept. 24, 1917, suffering from gas poisoning."

Pte. Murchison left here with the 105th Regiment and was subsequently drafted to France. He was wounded in the forehead last March, and on recovery returned to the front to be in time for Vimy Ridge and Hill 70. He was in another engagement in which 150 went in and only three, including himself, came out unscathed.

Mr. Murchison has another son Angus at the front in the 98th Siege Battery. He has been nearly two years in France and so far has escaped without a scratch.

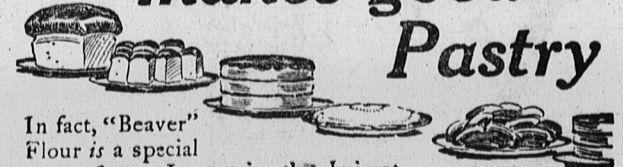


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
