TURKISH ARMY IN BAD STATE

Starvation, Smallpox and Fevers Surrender Inevitable.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Feb. 5.—The Bulgarians are devoting their attention to the bombardment of Adrianople in an attempt to capture Gallipoli Peninsula and take the Turkish forts in the rear.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 5.—Apart from an hour's cannonading by the Bulgarians Monday evening, at the time of the termination of the armistice to which the Turks did not respond, no further aggressive act of war is reported at the Thetalia fortifications.

On the other hand the retreat of the Bulgarian right wing and the burning of the town of Thetalia is confirmed from various sources.

SCHOOL TEACHERS ARE EXCITED

LONDON, Feb. 4.—The school teachers of London, twelve thousand of whom are male and six thousand female, are greatly excited over a plebiscite on the subject of equal pay to which the recent annual meeting of the teachers of London was pledged by resolutions, prior to which, however, a committee laid down a scale demanding a minimum of \$500 a year for men, rising to \$1,000 a year for women, rising to \$1,900 a year. JOHN, Feb. 4.—Yesterday morning while the crews of the government steamers Aberdeen and Stanley were engaged in hoisting one of the heavy winches from the Stanley, Arthur Davis, a winchman on the Aberdeen had one of his feet caught between the winch and the rail and sustained a compound fracture of the foot. The injured man was taken to the General Public Hospital for treatment.

CHIEF OF MANITOBA MOUNTED POLICE DEAD

DAUPHIN, Man., Feb. 3.—Charles Rooke, chief of the Manitoba Mounted Police and police magistrate, died this morning after a hard but hopeless fight for life, since Sunday week, when he was shot through the lungs while trying to arrest John Baran, a Galician homesteader, wanted for wife desertion. In attempting to capture Baran, after Rooke was shot, the posse fusilled the house, and besides fatally injuring the woman, killed her baby, only to find Baran was not within, though he was arrested later on.

N. Y. POLICE CORRUPTION

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—The confession of a patrolman to-day gave the District Attorney the long sought instrument by which he expects to uncover corruption in the New York police department. The investigation of alleged graft among the police was aided by Patrolman Eugene F. Fox. On the first day of his trial for bribery, Fox suddenly changed his plea and acknowledged his guilt.
