...would lead us to think that this "prince of the vegetable kingdom" is difficult to raise.

In the first place there are few requirements that must be met or failure is inevitable.

The first is a rich soil. A good garden loam mixture, with a third of sharp sand is satisfactory for all varieties, and if you have some leaf mold to stir in all the better.

The next is not to have too much pot room, as all palms are best when restricted in this respect. Good drainage is even of a more essential for palms than other plants, and this is especially true if they are kept away from the light, as is often done for decorative purposes. Without the layer of crockery in the bottom of each pot the soil is likely to become sour and the leaves turn yellow.

While palms do not need the sun and will burn if they are kept too near the pane, they must have plenty of light. When used in halls and the backs of rooms see that the different plants are changed frequently, so that all get their turn at least a day or two a week by the window. All palms are benefited by fresh air when grown indoors. Don't let this be a draught nor should the window be open over them, but there are few days in winter when indirect air will prove helpful. As spring approaches the plants can be stood outdoors in the middle of mild days.

One secret of palm failure is gas. If there is a leak in the main not perceptible to human beings palms will suffer from it by turning yellow and sickly.

The greatest injury done to palms is in the watering.

and advocated cold storage from the place of original sale to destination and that no private individual should be supported by the Government to take any undue advantage over private competitors in the same line of business.

These are the arguments put forth by the Opposition while this subject was under discussion in the Legislature. Such are the facts as can easily be proven.

Now, I claim cold storage, as established to be detrimental to the whole Province; for today it has become a well known fact that Davis & Fraser bonused by the Hazzard Government, at the expense of the farmers, have bought hogs as low as 6 1/2 and 7 cents, while their competitors had to wait for cold weather to enable them to ship, and paid, not less than 8 1/2 cents; and the price should not, at any time have been below that figure as the market could afford it. While paying these prices they were confronted with the pork bought by Davis & Fraser for 6 1/2 and 7 cents, and stored at the expense of the farmers, which The Patriot so lauds on the eve of an election.

While this subject was under discussion in the Legislature, it will be remembered that Mr. Hazzard and his supporters strongly emphasized his contention that the arrangement made with the Steam Navigation Company called for a storage from the island to the mainland. This is the Steam Navigation Company positively denies. Mr. Hazzard's assertions were not correct.

If this were the agreement with the Steam Navigation Co., why has not Mr. Hazzard forced the Steam Navigation Co. to supply such cold storage?

If the cold storage now supplied by the Government will not make a better impression upon the dealers than has already been experienced, it cannot merit the patronage of the general public. It is claimed that large quantities of eggs that have been stored in Charlottetown and marketed through the province have been found to be actually useless, hence unfit for human food and a complete loss to the purchaser.

The Patriot refrains from telling the public what the cold storage system has cost the farmers and the amount of money that Davis & Fraser has been able to make by being in a position to take advantage of winter conditions and storing perishable stock at the expense of the farmers. Nor yet have they told the public what private interest the Hazzard Government may have in forcing such an encumbrance upon the Province, or if the editor of The Patriot has, in any way, been subsidized by the Government to blow the bugle at the last hour.

This is a question that should engage the serious attention of the electors of the Second District of Queen's at the present time and should be put to the Government candidate now seeking support. FARMER.

EQUINE DENTISTRY IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

(By Consul Frank Deedmeier, Charlottetown, Canada.)

Many of the horses raised in Prince Edward Island are noted for their endurance and swiftness, and they generally command a higher price than those of the other eastern provinces of the Dominion of Canada.

Breeding received great attention, not only from owners of stables, but also from farmers. The animals are kept at all times in prime condition. The practice is growing general to have veterinary dentists look after the teeth, usually once a year.

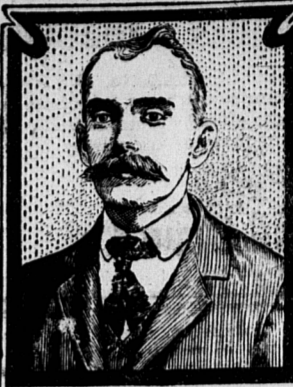
Horse teeth, as is well known, are in the main subject to all the afflictions of the teeth of human beings. Diseased teeth or those of improper lengths interfere with mastication and digestion, and often give rise to certain diseases of the mouth. In the horse the upper molar overlap the lower set, and as a consequence of this the outer edge of the upper and the inner edge of the lower teeth gradually become worn to such a degree of sharpness that the tongue and cheeks are often lacerated.

The remedy here consists in the removal of these sharp points. Dented, fractured, and otherwise injured teeth are attracted. Often injuries to the jaws and to the cavities of the mouth are caused by gravel, nails, and other hard substances lodging between the teeth, taken into the mouth with food. These are removed after an examination. During the shedding of the temporary teeth the animal's mouth is examined frequently, as some of the temporary teeth, if not properly shed, may interfere with the growth of the permanent ones. The most progressive farmers also give attention to the teeth of their milch cows.

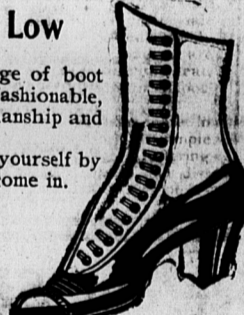
