SUDDEN DEATH OF MR. ARTHUR LIGERTWOOD

(Victoria Daily Colonist, Oct. 10th.)

Another victim was added to the long list of those who have lost their lives in the waters of the George yesterday morning when death came to Mr. Arthur Gordon Ligertwood, 210 George Road West, while he was taking his daily plunge. He was seen approaching the public bathing houses near his home dressed in a bathing suit and dressing gown. Later he was seen in the water. When some distance from the bank he showed signs of distress, and before help could be provided he had apparently lost consciousness.

Constable Hastings of the Saanich police department; Messrs. J. Young, W. Harman, W. Garrard, J. Gorg, W. Harman, W. Garrard, J. Gorg, and others, did all in their power to effect revivification but were unsuccessful as he expired shortly after reaching the shore. Dr. H. J. Wasson was summoned and pronounced life extinct.

Examination disclosed the fact that the deceased had taken but very little water in his lungs, and the supposition is that he was stricken by a sudden attack of heart trouble. The coroner, Dr. E. C. Hart, was notified and the remains were removed to the B. C. Funeral Company's establishment, where an inquest will be held to determine the exact cause of death.

Was Widely Known

The late Mr. Ligertwood was widely known throughout Victoria and the surrounding district. He had taken a keen interest in various businesses in the city and was a member of several industrial and financial directorates. He is survived by a widow, Miss Marjory Stewart of Strathgarny, P. E. Island and a grown-up family.

During later years, or since he had retired from active business, he had taken a large interest in municipal affairs affecting the welfare of Victoria, and in this connection had served in many voluntary capacities. He was ever ready to give both time and financial assistance to worthy objects. His departure will be keenly felt by those with whom he had been associated in the general welfare work of the community.

The late Mr. Ligertwood made the bulk of his fortune as a rancher in the southern portion of the United States. He came to Victoria some years ago and made his home here. Funeral arrangements have not yet been announced.

Prince of Wales College Debate

Section A of the Debating Society of Prince of Wales College debated on Tuesday, Oct. 21st, on the subject: "Resolved that the women of Canada are exercising the franchise for the betterment of Canada."

Miss Anna MacDonald, leader of the pro side, advanced many arguments in support of the resolution, the numbers of which were greatly augmented by her co-speakers, Mary Dalton, Gordon Coffin and Joseph Fisher. They stated that women are the intellectual and moral equals of men, who, unlike the members of the opposite sex, can often be bribed by money or drink. Women are interested in politics, but do not hold their discussions on the street corners, as do men. The betterment of conditions in the United States was referred to.

Miss Margaret Cantello, con side leader, said that although the women voted prohibition in, they had not really improved the country, as most of the provinces were going back again. Her supporters, Charles Green, John Andrew and Isabel Phillips, stated that women do not use their own judgment, but vote as their husbands. They are influenced by the smooth-tongued orator. The woman's place is in the home. The vote resulted in a victory for the pro side by a majority of 12.

The debate in Sect. B. for Oct. 21st was on the subject "Resolved that we should conform to the tyranny of convention."

Miss Dixon Matheson, leader of the pro side opened the debate and in a forceful speech brought up many points in favour of the resolution. She gave many instances to prove that convention is the backbone of civilization, such as the system of education, and rule of the road. She referred to the degradation of Russia, resulting from disregard for the laws of convention. The other members of the pro side were not present. The con leader, Miss Mary Rogers was ably supported by Neil Matheson, Muriel Weeks and Reginald Myers. Their arguments referred mainly to political tyranny, social customs in ancient and modern times, class.
