The Canadian Pacific Railway is also up in arms as Canadian cattle must be shipped via Intercolonial to St. John and Halifax for shipment.

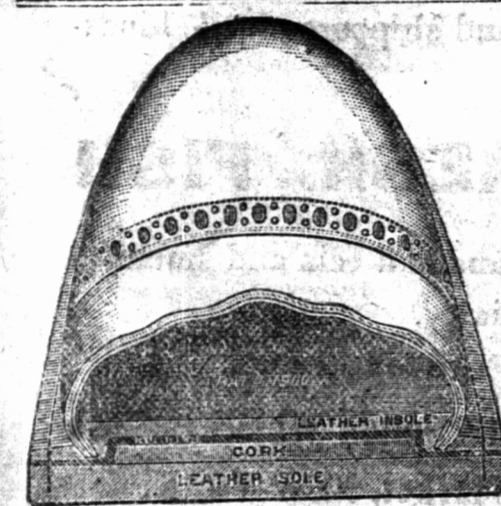
SMALLPOX BREAKS OUT IN A CONVENT.

MORGAN PAYS THE SHAREHOLDERS.

LONDON, December 1.—(Special)—Morgan's payments in connection with the purchase of the International Mercantile Marine Company were carried out today and about three hundred of the shareholders of the White Star and Dominion Lines appeared before noon and were paid by cheques. The absorption of the Nickel Corporation by the International Nickel Corporation, an American concern, was practically completed, 93 percent of the shareholders of the British concern having accepted the offer up to today.

THE CALEDONIAN BANQUET HELD AT THE QUEEN HOTEL

The Sons of Scotland Celebrate the Anniversary of their Patron Saint With Feast, Speech and Song—Eloquent Tributes to Scotland and Canada—A Royal Feast and Right Good Time.

There was a company of some 75 persons present at the annual dinner of the Caledonian Club in the Queen Hotel last evening. The spacious dining room was draped on every wall with national flags. A very sumptuous repast was spread in the best style of the Queen, of which the following is the menu:

It was eleven o'clock when the toast list was entered upon. The first toast, The King, was loyally honored, with hearty singing of the National Anthem. The Day and a' who Honor it was received with full highland honors and the singing of Scots who hae wi' Wallace bled. It was responded to by J. E. B. McCready. Mr. McCready in responding spoke of the human characteristics of St. Andrew as being dominated by brotherliness and manliness, which were also characteristics of the Scottish people, than whom none had stronger family ties, and no manlier race existed. The significance of a national day was dwelt upon. The United States on 4th July celebrated their independence. Scotland could not do that as she had always been free. Canada's national day referred to the marriage of the P.vinces, when they had resolved to have one Government, one treasury and to stand together for all time in mutual defence. Scotland's anniversary stood out all the more and Scotchmen had achieved, for liberty, for religion, for the making and upbuilding of the Empire and the world. 'Take out of Canada what has been achieved by men of Scottish lineage and you must tear up our great railway lines, sink our steamships, wreck our chief financial institutions, demolish our noblest schools of learning and dissolve the very fabric of the Dominion into its original elements.' He spoke also of the hundreds of companies in many lands then met together to honor the name and fame of Scotland, wearing her national emblems, singing her national songs and rejoicing together in the proud fact that they were of Scottish descent.

The President of the United States was duly honored by singing Her Majesty's Good Fellow. In the absence of King, the well who sent his regrets Mr. Lockhart responded. The Governor General and Parliament of Canada was ably responded to by Hon. D. Farquharson, M. P., who among other matters touched upon made a strong plea against the reduction of our representation at Ottawa. J. R. Davison sang the March of the Cameron Men, arousing much enthusiasm. The Lieutenant-Governor and Local Legislature was happily responded to by G. E. Hughes, M. L. A. His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor was not present but sent a letter of regret. Mr. Hughes address gave a concise historical review of the Island's history under representative institutions. The Land of the Heather was duly honored, coupled with the name of Rev. T. F. Fallerton. He said in part: In responding to this toast which you have drunk with such enthusiasm, we must all realize that we are taking part in a great and important succession, for in the islands of Japan, in the great Australian Federation, in Madagascar, in Zanzibar, in our newly acquired African possessions and in the mother land, the
