Ontario Growers Lose When Potatoes Injured

Rough Handling of Product Reduces Annual Income Million Dollars—Marketing Board Experts Make Suggestions for Saving Crop—Plenty of Fresh Air Necessary—Too Many Culls Make Profits Shrink.

TORONTO, Oct. 5.—One million dollars annually is the approximate loss sustained by Ontario farmers due to careless and rough handling of potatoes. This was the startling pronouncement of J. T. Cassin, Ontario Marketing Board, "Bin inspection reports of Ontario certified seed growers show mechanical injury varying from 1 to 50 per cent., with the majority of cases approximately 10 to 15 per cent. Mechanically injured tubers are undesirable because of a direct loss they cause in preparing vegetables for the table and also an increased amount of shrinkage, rot, etc., which results during storage," he continued.

Handle tubers carefully when putting into pails or baskets and emptying into wagon boxes. The use of bushel boxes placed on low wagons which are drawn alongside the pickers is a great time-saver in emptying the pails. The use of boxes makes a convenient and careful way for unloading and prevents much of the severe cutting and bruising that often takes place when shovelling from wagon boxes. A slotted chute will permit much of the soil to drop through and prevent it from going into the bins.

Prevent Bruising

Potatoes should not be allowed to drop six or eight feet into a cellar or basement. A stand with a few sacks of straw on it on which the potatoes may fall will prevent much bruising. A temperature of 55 or 60 degrees Fahrenheit for about one week after harvesting, with adequate ventilation, is most desirable in order to hasten development of a protective covering on wounds. Should moisture accumulate before protective covering has been developed on the wounds they are likely to become seriously infected by rot-producing organisms. Very low temperatures immediately following harvesting are not desirable, because they delay wound healing. Where large bins are used for storage, air pipes or ventilators should be placed in the bins. This will prevent much sweating and heating.

Fresh Air Essential

Potato tubers are living plants and should be provided with plenty of fresh air. Costs of production are reduced to the minimum by having the highest percentage of the crop marketable in a high grade. Producing a crop of good potatoes to the harvesting stage entails much expense. Profits are what is left after costs are paid. Why lessen profits by increasing the percentage of culls? Therefore, culls should be reduced to the minimum by careful harvesting and storing. The consumer is learning to purchase by grade, and will pay more money for well-graded, good clean potatoes, free from rot and mechanical injury.

Practical Suggestions

Padding of the inside of digger. Using one continuous apron. Where shrink attachment at rear of machine is used, the iron rods should be covered with one-half-inch rubber hose. If vine kickers are used, draw a piece of rubber hose on to the points of the kickers.
