It is understood he had accepted an invitation to visit the country seat of a London resident. Before leaving London the Premier made another call at the war office. On leaving London on Saturday he motored down to Boxley Heath, Kent, to visit Sir Charles Tupper, the sole surviving father of the Canadian confederation.

HOWARD DREW TO RETIRE FROM TRACK.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Aug. 16.—Howard Drew of this city, the track athlete, has announced his intention to retire from racing in a signed statement published here. Telegraphing from the Panama-Pacific Exposition field, where he was beaten on Saturday in the 100-yard dash event of the senior A. A. track and field meet, Drew said: "Was bothered with my leg a great deal in the race, so that I pulled up lame at the finish. For I now weigh only 150 pounds, and that is much below my normal. I want to say right here at I am through with open competition after this year."

SANTA CLAUS PLEA MAY LIFT WAR BAN.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—The foreign trade advisers of the State Department expect to receive requests from American importers to assist them in getting dolls and toys manufactured in Germany into the United States for the Christmas trade.

In 1914 the United States imported \$1,791,912 worth of dolls and toys from Germany. Other European countries sent \$5,926,941 in Christmas goods. This year there have been no importations from Germany. Under the British orders in council, it will be impossible to get the ordinary supply of toys from Germany, unless the British Government changes its attitude. All products of every class manufactured in Germany are banned under the order, but it is believed that a general demand on the part of doll and toy importers might induce Great Britain to raise the barriers high enough to let American children receive their usual supply of toys.

BREWERY QUITS BEER TO MALT MILK.

GOLDEN, Colo., Aug. 16.—Coors Brewery, one of the largest in Colorado, has made its last beer. Beginning next week it will be turned into a plant for making milk. The brewers will be used in the new work. The brewery represents a big investment, and the owners switched to the new product because of improved prospects.

YOUNG NURSE IS A HEROINE

The correspondent of the Algemeen Handelsblad in a letter "from the English front" tells the following story of an English nurse:—"I was now far from the trenches and was walking along a sunken road, when rounding a curve I saw a bent figure slowly moving forward. I hurried up. At first I stood speechless. I saw a girl of not more than twenty-three years of age carrying on her shoulder a young British infantryman. The young man had been shot through the shoulder and after a preliminary dressing of the wound he had been told to go to the nearest field hospital. Taking a wrong turning he had lost his way, had collapsed and fainted.

In this state the young girl—she was a British nurse—found him. As it was at least half-an-hour's walk to the nearest field hospital she decided to carry him there. The brave girl readily accepted my assistance. We made my overcoat into a stretcher and together carried the wounded man to the hospital. After receiving a satisfactory report from the doctor the young girl continued her walk.

KING OF GREECE WANTS PLEDGE OF NEUTRALITY FROM VENIZELOS.

ROTTERDAM, Aug. 15.—The Nieuwe Rotterdamse Courant prints a despatch from Berlin which says the Tagblatt learns from Athens that the King of Greece, after the opening of parliament next Monday, and the resignation of the cabinet, will ask M. Venizelos, the former Premier, whether he is ready to form a new cabinet on the principle of the strictest neutrality.
