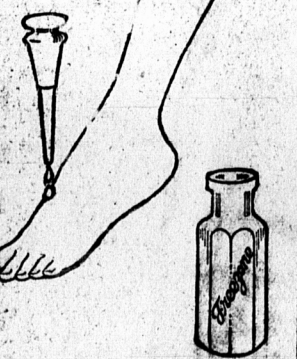

Bitter Attack On Lord French

LONDON, Oct. 24.—John William Fortescue, who is writing the official story of the war, has contributed to the Quarterly Review articles dealing with the controversy regarding Field Marshal Viscount French when he was in command of the forces in France.

"The fact we fear is," says Mr. Fortescue, "that on the 26th of Sept. 1914, Lord French and his staff completely lost their heads, and that in a vain endeavour to conceal this he has taken leave of all sense of accuracy." Further referring to General French's treatment of General Sir Horace L. Smith-Dorrien, commander of the Second Army in France, Mr. Fortescue says "General French has descended to mis-statements and misrepresentations of the clumsiest and most ludicrous kind in order to injure the reputation of a subordinate who is forbidden to defend himself. Coming from one in his high position this brings shame and dishonour not only upon the Field Marshal himself but upon the army."

A PERMANENT INTERNATIONAL TRADE CONGRESS

ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 21.—Organization of a permanent international trade conference to perpetuate the work now being undertaken by the conference was unanimously decided on today by the American and foreign sub-committees on permanent organization. Details will be worked out by a committee of ten members, two from each of the nations represented at the conference, and they will submit their report at the open meeting of delegates for a general discussion of the question which has been called for tonight.

In the formal discussion among the committee members it was the opinion of the majority that another international conference would be held in 1920 whereas after that date the general body could meet in two years. No place for the 1920 meeting was suggested, this and other details being left until the permanent organization is effected.

Adjourning the session tonight Secretary Lane declared the conference had produced nothing and advised it to take a new start by adjourning for several days while a coordination committee of not more than six members frame a programme of action.

Nothing Accomplished.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The joint conference of scale committees of miners and operators of the central competitive coal fields, which was called by Secretary Wilson in hope of averting a strike on November 1, adjourned late today until tomorrow without reaching any agreement. Leaders of both factions asserted that their respective attitudes had not been changed in any way.

PREDICTION THAT SCOTLAND WILL GO DRY NEXT YEAR

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—"Scotland is going dry next year," according to the Rev. Dr. J. H. Jowett, who sailed on the Adriatic for England today after preaching a month in his former pulpit at the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church.

"It will surprise many," he said, "that I make the assertion that Scotland next year will vote to go dry. For I do not believe that it is realized here how far the temperance movement has progressed in the British Isles. A country which has prohibition will become eighty per cent more efficient than one which has not, and drink ridden countries across the sea will have to follow in the footsteps of the United States of all behind in the economic race."

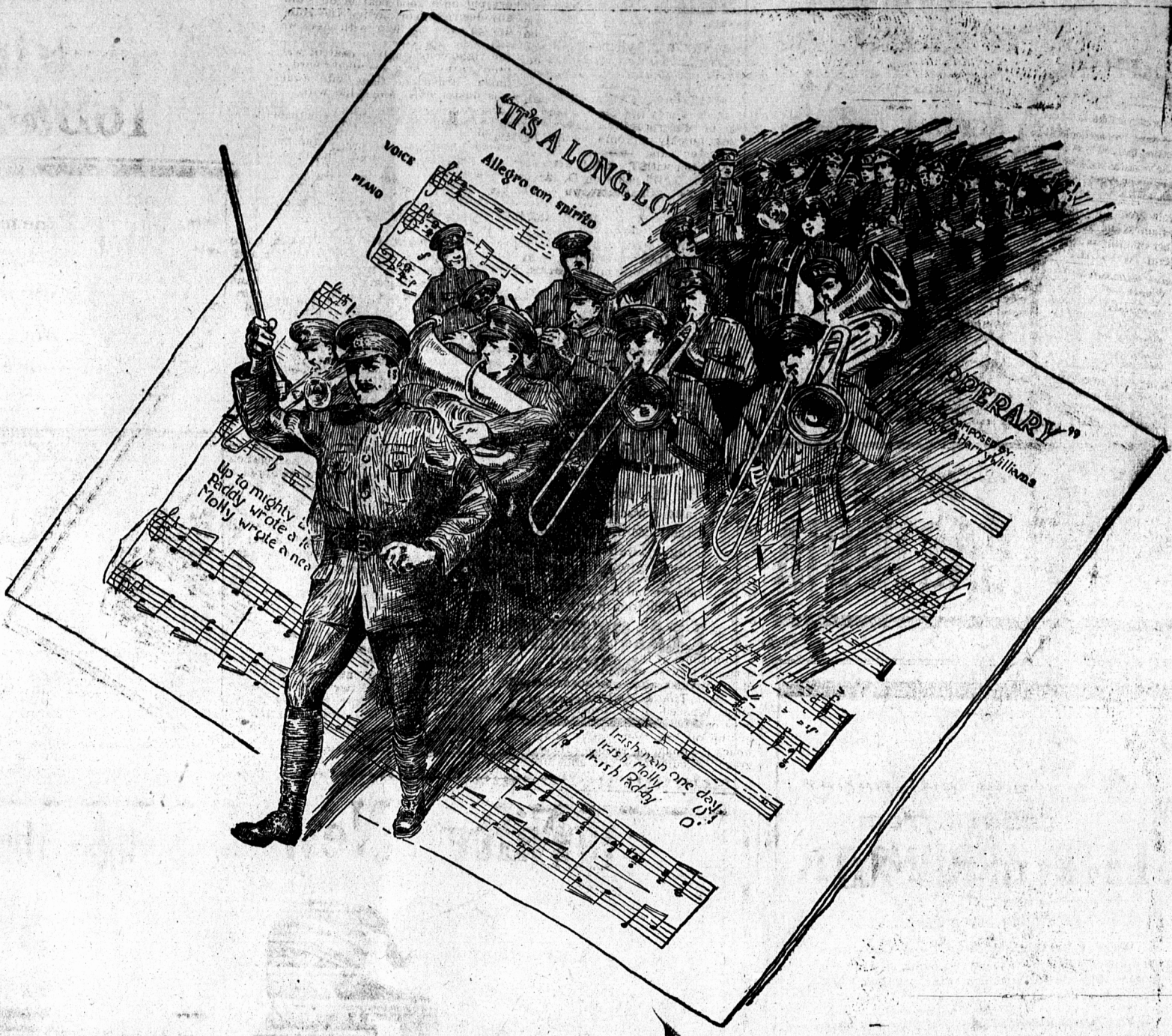
BRITISH STEAMER GOES AGROUND AT POINT DU CHENE

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 26.—The British steamer, The Hornsea, two thousand tons, is aground in Point du Chene Harbor, and all effort to get her off today were unavailing. The Hornsea arrived at Point du Chene yesterday morning from Manchester to take part of a cargo of deals, and then proceed to Parrshore to finish loading. She ran aground while avoiding a collision with two schooners. The Hornsea is commanded by Captain Munroe and carries a crew of thirty. She is one of the steamers taken over from the Germans by the British government. Efforts to float her today are not successful. She has five hundred tons of coal in her bunkers. Only the bow is aground and the ship is not thought to have suffered any damage.
