As Armour Controls Provision Business of the West—Associated with Dom. Coal Co.—Will Control Pork, Butter, Eggs, Hay, Grain and Produce—Surprise at Island Government's Rash Action.

MY EXPERIENCE AMONG THE SAND HOGS

A Well Known Citizen Spends Half An Hour in a Caisson Sixty Two Feet Beneath the Surface of the Hillsborough River.

Enjoying the luxury of a row on the harbor Saturday last, our prow pointing to the new bridge, wind and tide aiding us (but not abetting us on our return) we soon drew alongside a huge caisson. A contiguous scow offered a landing place. With interest we watched the mining of the cement, climbed to the top of a caisson to see it deposited. Repr: has it that this very caisson marked our visit by sinking out of sight during the hours of darkness. This may be a habit of caissons after persons of distinction have visited them, my grade in the social scale is marked by the fact that the occurrence happened hours after my visit, had I been a dignitary I tremble to think that our going might have been synchronous. A few strong pulls and we were at the dredge. Here we were informed by friend Lamont (on this occasion he sang—Come under my lee in place of plaidie) that a trim looking boat yclept the Swan had been secured by the men as she was drifting by. She gave them quite a chase and now lies awaiting an owner.

Our names being given to the Captain we were courteously shown the dredge, its powerful machinery and its operations explained. We next approached the pneumatic caisson. "No admittance" printed and verbal met us as far as the machinery room or scow was concerned. Mr. Tabor kindly invited us to rest our aching arms (the current was very strong) by landing on the pier. No? I think. We watched for some minutes the huge bucket bringing up its red clay. The Government engineers happened to be on the point of making a descent. My request to be allowed to accompany them met with a kindly acquiescence. I was soon arrayed in oil skins. Was instructed to hold my nostrils closed with my thumb and to blow out my cheeks. We climbed up and were soon ensconced in the lock. This is a portion of the tube which has two doors, the lower one is closed when the upper one is opened. In a moment the upper door was shut and we were in for it. A valve was opened and a fierce hissing ensued. Following my instructions I blew with might and main. My eardrums were blown in or out I know not which but I fancied they were trying to get through an orifice hundred times too small to allow of their escape. Then came a cessation of hostilities and a kindly voice asked how I felt. I responded "All right" and at once the valve recommenced its insane task. I felt this time that it would succeed, when the second let up came, I answered the friendly queries

very guardedly. I thought I was all right, etc. Then came the third and last assault. Just when I'd reached a point where I remembered that I had a note unattended to at the bank and that I should have to go and attend to it at once the lower door opened and our further descent commenced. Once in motion all sense of discomfort was lost except a ringing in the ears comparable to the tinnitus ensuing on diving. The clayey, greasy rungs of the iron ladder were made things of beauty as the electric lights played on them. Soon we were in the chamber. Some nine men stripped to the waists bent to their task of picking the hard clay or shovelling it into the huge bucket which has its separate tube. As this went up into its lock an influx of cold air caused an all enveloping steam. Numerous electric lights lit up the place and took off some of the weirdness. The valve that fed us with compressed air clicked away merrily. I asked my companion if that little valve was all that stood between us and death. His answer was to the effect that it not only fed us with air but was our safeguard against the water coming in and making our habitation unpleasantly damp, and, if our creaking friend stopped long enough, positively dangerous. Next I asked if the mighty timbers which shored the roof of our chamber could stand the hundreds of tons of cement, stone and granite which formed the pier. The answer satisfied me that my name and destination would be one if they did not. I seized a shovel and contributed my quota towards building the bridge. I gave of the sweat of my brow and body and was thankful to be called to witness the boring for bed rock. The drill found this some four or five feet below our then level so that by this time next week the pier will be resting on its solid foundation. I attempted to whistle but found this impossible. I sang and shouted sans difficulty but whistling was beyond me. The air was easy to breathe and one could speak and be heard with the ordinary voice. The pulse was more rapid than ordinary. The temperature was about 75, I imagine. The ordinary candle will not burn but specially prepared caisson candles were used to dry into dark corners, etc. At the changing of the shift we ascended once more into the lock the bottom door was closed beneath us and the process of letting out the compressed air went on. I experienced no unpleasantness and heaved a big sigh of relief as the upper door
