HEAD OF ORDER VISITS LOCAL ORANGE LODGE

Grand Master For British North America Officially Welcomed Monday night.

Boyer Lodge, L. O. L., Charlottetown was honored on Monday evening with an official visitation by the Most Worshipful Grand Master and Sovereign of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of British America and Newfoundland, Hon. Lieut. Col. C. Ashmore Kidd, Speaker of the Ontario Legislature, who was welcomed by an overflowing audience.

W. M. Muttart, G. M. of Summerside, presided. Col. Kidd was presented with an address of welcome by Hon. G. S. Sharp, Councillor Samuel Kennedy, Acting Mayor.

Hon. Mr. Kidd in the course of his address reviewed the growth and progress of the Orange Association in Canada and Newfoundland.

He left yesterday afternoon for Summerside. Hon. Mr. Sharp spoke of the pleasure it gave him to be present to assist in welcoming so distinguished a personage as the guest of the evening. He regretted that his stay was to be of such a short duration and trusted that at an early date he would find it convenient to return to us again bringing with him his wife and family.

Mr. Sharp spoke of the various nationalities making up our provincial citizenship, drawn from Loyalists from the eastern States who wished to remain under the British flag, emigrants from the British Isles and France, now blended together in a happy and loyal Canadianhood.

Prince Edward Island, the smallest member of the Dominion, has already formed a notable place in it and has given to the Dominion many brilliant sons. This country is rich in agriculture and fisheries and the people as a whole are happy and contented. Again expressing his pleasure on being present, although not a member of the association, he congratulated the guest of the evening on his admirable address.

O'vie Greeting

Councillor Kennedy, representing the Mayor, delivered the following address:

As a member of the Council of the capital city of the Province, and on behalf of His Worship, the Mayor, who is unavoidably absent, and of the citizens of Charlottetown—it gives me very great pleasure to extend to the distinguished guest of the evening a most hearty and cordial welcome to our city.

In your various activities through out your career—which are too numerous to mention in detail, we find that you, sir, have invariably started at the lower rung of the ladder, and have proven so diligent and faithful to every trust reposed in you, that your true worth has forced you to the top.

During your life as a citizen of Kingston you have not only been a member for some years of the Aldermanic Board, but you have served with great credit on the various committees promoting the general welfare and prosperity of the military city of Kingston. Sudden Death Of Mrs. Milligan

The Guardian regrets that through misinformation received at a late hour on Sunday night, an entirely erroneous impression was conveyed in the report carried on its front page of the death of Mrs. Katherine Milligan. There was no foundation in fact for the suggestion that the house was cold or that Mrs. Milligan was in want of anything. Indeed, there was evidence on every side that she had been well cared for and well looked after.

The deceased, who occupied a comfortable apartment at 25 Bayfield Street, was found on Sunday morning lying across her bed in her bedroom, the apparent cause of death being heart failure. Mr. George Carr, a neighbor of the deceased, notified him in the apartments of the deceased, both up and downstairs. He knocked for admittance and on receiving no response notified the police. Sergeant William McInnis at once responded and on his arrival Mr. Carr entered through a window, then admitted the officer. Entering the kitchen they found a lamp burning and a rocking chair near the stove. Continuing through the other rooms they reached the bedroom of the deceased and here found the body lying across the bed, with an upturned chair nearby, an alarm clock on the floor and two lamps burning.

It is thought the unfortunate woman was preparing to retire and had taken the alarm clock to set the alarm for the following morning when stricken.

Mr. Carr at once telephoned the Coroner who on his arrival considered an inquest unnecessary.

The late Mrs. Milligan, who was a retired trained nurse, was frequently visited by neighbors and relatives with whom she was very popular and her sudden passing causes widespread regret not only among her immediate friends but among a large circle of former patients throughout the city and country.

The funeral was held at 10.30 a. m. on Monday from the residence of her brother Mr. J. H. G. Murphy Great George Street, to the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer where a Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Jos. McGree, C. S. S. R.

The pallbearers were Messrs. J. Bradley, Matthew McCourt, Joseph Storey, Joseph Costello, Angus McLeod and James Dalton.

Service at the grave was conducted by Rev. R. P. Murphy, C. S. S. R.

Lidstone welcomed Col. Kidd on behalf of the citizens of Summerside. Col. Kidd delivered an excellent address of great interest to orangers throughout the Empire. Other speakers were Rev. M. SUDDEN DEATH AT CORNWALL OBSERVED BY LOCAL GYROS

He had visited British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Manitoba, and while we are passing through the stage of depression it did not seem to dampen the optimism of our Orange brethren, who looked hopefully to the future.

He gave a most interesting account of the various charitable institutions under the direction of the Orange Association to be found in every province in the Dominion, and said in this province you are also carrying on your system of charity. In British Columbia there had just been completed one of the finest buildings of its kind in the Dominion for the maintenance of orphan children.

He praised the work of the Ladies' Benevolent Orange Association and dwelt at some length on its very rapid growth, and the splendid effect it was having on the order in general.
