Yesterday the chimney of the old power-house at the Railway yard was thrown down, and several other old buildings were demolished to make clear the land for the operations of the contractors who are to build the new round house.

Two men, for selling the journal known as Free Speech, were arrested in St. John the other day. As this paper has been circulated in this province the following extract from the St. John Standard will be of interest: George Merissee and Nicholas Alhotis, two Greeks, were arrested last evening on the charge of selling printed matter tending to corrupt public morals. They had in their possession a large number of copies of the paper known as The Free Speech, which is published weekly in Moncton and which for the last two months has been on sale in this city. The two Greeks who, are employed in Sprudake's fruit store, were arrested between 8 p. m. and 9 p. m., by Acting Sergeant Scott and Policemen Marshall and Hughes, on a warrant sworn out by Officer Lucas. The information was laid under the section in the criminal code which makes it an indictable offence to sell printed matter which tends to corrupt morals. Free Speech is edited by C. B. McDougall, of Moncton, and the name of "W. C. Loggie" is announced as business manager. The sheet is printed in Newcastle and is sold broadcast over the Maritime Provinces wherever buyers are found at the price of five cents a copy. The mails were closed to the publication some months ago and it has since been shipped by express to St. John and other parts of the Maritime Provinces. Since May 22 it has been sold every Friday in the city through the medium of several dealers and newsboys. The stores pay three cents for each paper and retail them to the public for five cents. Sent direct from the publishers the boys made a profit of a quarter of a cent on each paper. It is estimated that the sale in St. John has varied from 500 to 4000 copies each week. When the Greeks were arrested last night four bundles of the paper were confiscated and carried to the police court. Merissee, one of the prisoners, is no stranger to the police court. His first appearance was at the time of his arrest on a warrant charging him with obtaining money under false pretences. This developed into a civil case and he was allowed to go. About a year ago he was the complainant in a stabbing affray which ended happily for all concerned.

An interesting naphtha boat race was pulled off in Pictou harbor on Saturday afternoon. The New Glasgow speeder owned by Jackson McGregor went up against the fleetest craft in the vicinity—the Viper, so called, owned by Mr. Wetmore. The distance of twelve miles was over a circular course from the government Pier to the Light. The New Glasgow boat had a 7 H. P. Fraser Engine and was managed by Jimmy Williams, a Charlottetown boy, and Mr. Wetmore's was fitted with a Ferro of 12 Horse Power. The Viper took the lead at the start and won out by almost three miles.

An experienced seafarer and marine engineer who has witnessed the daring displayed by some motor boat captains in this harbor, has suggested that The Guardian convey a word of warning to those who are inclined to do foolhardy acts. For instance: the other night when the str. Northumberland was entering port, there was among the pleasure craft out in the harbor a motor boat which kept just at the edge of the waves thrown up by the steamer's propeller. The "North" raises quite a sea behind, and this motor boat was bobbing like a cork. She was well managed although she had quite a number aboard, but had any of her passengers got excited and risen in the boat there might have been a fatality to record. It is wisdom for the "captains" of pleasure-craft to give large steamers a wide berth.
