Interesting To All

Mr. William George Simpson, of Kensington, who lately returned from an interesting trip across the continent, right to the coast, has favored our "Y" in Kensington with an instructive interview. Mr. Simpson left for the West on Feb. 6, going direct to the coast. As far as Montreal he had the pleasure of the company of the genial representative in the Federal Legislature, Hon. A. E. McLean. Mr. Simpson tells us that Mr. McLean made this part of the journey advantageous and interesting in Montreal he visited the Royal Victoria Hospital, and was pleased to see Miss Lillian Pidgeon, Kensington and Dr. F. H. McKay, a native of Summerside, Lot 67, who has made good in the home of his adoption. He found temporary coincided with Mr. W. A. Jenkins, Vernon, a prominent farmer, who also was taking advantage of a trip to the Pacific.

Paving through Ottawa at night, he was unable to take advantage of any interesting experience that he might have gained there.

Speeding westward, he formed acquaintances with parties who had previously described the great havoc wrought by the disastrous forest fires which swept that region on October 4 and succeeding days. The extreme length reached by the fire was about thirty miles, and several miles wide. Valuable timber areas were destroyed, some sections worth \$300 per acre. The total loss, including the town of Halleyburg, reached \$7,000,000, with only \$2,000,000 insurance. The loss of life in the disastrous conflagration was almost 100 souls. Some escaped the fire by wading into the water and holding a wet blanket over the head. He passed through Cobalt and gained some knowledge of the valuable ore deposit. He also visited Timmons, and surrounding areas. Some of the richest deposits of silver ore to be found in the world are mined in this section.

Travelling through this region on a previous trip he was vividly impressed with the impelling advantages as a grazing country, including leagues and leagues of rich grazing lands but exposed to summer frosts which are hostile to grain vitality. Large areas are covered with forests suitable for pulp wood, and dotting the line at intervals are numerous pulp mills resort as well as a sportsman's paradise. This expanse is easily reached by the grand "National Transcontinental." Emerging from this scenic stretch and entering Winnipeg, he was met by a raging blizzard, the worst experienced in years. All train services were cancelled for more than thirty hours. But this interruption was turned to advantage by his visiting the most interesting points in the busy city of Central Canada. Here he met Mr. William Pound, a native of Margate, who is never too busy to entertain a P. E. Islander. He lavished upon Mr. Simpson every attention and marked this period of the trip with an indelible impression. It makes one's heart warm to Island hospitality when the scene of lavishness is beset with distant, extraneous surroundings. Mr. Pound defends the profession of salesman in an auto business, and he has the reputation of being the most expert solicitor in the city of Winnipeg.

In Winnipeg he visited the Hudson Bay Company store the company that so inseparably is written up in the history of Canada. He also visited the store of T. E. Esau, warmly welcomed by one of the Whitehead boys of Kensington.

In the railway yards he marked every sign of flourishing business, much shipping being done. He dropped into the grain exchange, and was much impressed with his first experience in such a commercial manifestation. He witnessed sales effected in wheat at 116 1/2 for May delivery, and wheat at 116 1/2 for most of this side of Saskatoon, was the depth of snow on the Prairies, which measured from two to three feet. He saw horses on this area, pawing up the snow to expose the grass for feed. They showed no discontent, even with snow banks on their backs. Moving westward, he found less snow at Edmonton, and milder weather with more sunshine. Little snow was seen from here to the Rockies. He was greatly surprised to find that the ascent and descent of the mountain pass could be made without the aid of an extra locomotive.

He was surprised to find the marked absence of snow and the continued advantage of fine weather at a high altitude. It was here he was surprised with the sublimity of the mountain scenery which appealed so keenly to his acutely speculative mind. This area has the gratifying reputation of possessing the world's record breaker Holstein cow, which has excelled any mark previously made. It has also a record for fruit-growing capabilities—apples, apricots, cherries, raspberries, strawberries, growing in abundance. At Kamloops snow had almost disappeared, but at Chilliwack he found that this division had sustained an unusually heavy snow fall. This is a rich, farming country, mixed farming being the popular. Creeping down the Thompson River, one would marvel at the human intuition could afford means of transit, that is safe, so perilous a situation. the memory of her poetic genius. The advantages for exhilarating exercise are multiplex. The summer resorts are almost innumerable, and are all recreative, furnishing unlimited opportunities for health-giving exercise. He also visited the capital city of this important western province—Victoria, and was much impressed by its emphatic wealth which is enjoyed in quiet retirement. Here he called upon the Minister of Public Works, in the Provincial Government, Mr. Sutherland, a son of the late Robert Sutherland, Sea View. Hon. W. Sutherland has certainly proved to the West that this province, smallest in extension, but by no means least in comprehension of resources, is capable of exercising abilities to discharge high official functions in larger and more wealthy provinces.

Returning to Vancouver, he had the poetic pleasure of seeing the sun sink to rest in the placid waters of the Pacific. The sail of 80 miles from Vancouver to Victoria was one of rare pleasure and was executed all the while in a abrupt and sublime attitude that you traverse in the mountain division.

The route lies across Islands and between jutting rocks so close that you could project a missile from starboard or port to the impending petrofacitor.

Returning to Vancouver one is reminded that he must not forget to record his concept of the need for One of the first truths to engage the mind is the number of children in evidence, all healthy and happy and from the number and appearance of schools, one would conclude that accommodation is adequate for all. But a lack of room actually exists, and extra sessions are necessary to execute all the work in the same school building. This deficiency will be supplied in a short time when the new university, now in course of construction at Point Grey, will be opened.

The churches are numerous, gracefully built of stone, and all are well attended.

The hotels are factitively modern and serve the corporal needs as efficiently as the churches serve the mental and the moral. Among the most prominent is the C.P.R. Hotel. The auditorium alone is capable of supplying the needs of one thousand persons.

The General Hospital is a splendid institution, maintaining a staff of about 200 in number, including Dominion wide hospital needs. But, thoughtful reader, having seen this great Dominion from ocean to ocean, having observed as closely as transient opportunity would permit, Mr. Simpson has the good judgment to conclude that our own Island Province has much that the people here do, or should more adequately appreciate. He also maintains that our native born, whether remaining at home or going abroad, can successfully compete with the best that our fair Canada can produce.

DEATH VICTORY IN THE END OVER DISCOVERY OF SCIENCE

OTTAWA, April 13.—Life was restored here, Sunday, to a new born babe that died within a few minutes after birth, and the infant was kept alive for six hours by the use of adrenalin, a powerful drug that now is engaging the attention of the medical world. Death was victor in the end, however.

The baby, born in a hospital, was pronounced dead a few minutes after birth. Attending physicians decided on the use of the drug. The baby's lungs had not functioned. When the heart stopped beating the drug was injected into the heart tissues, and thirty seconds later the organ began to function again. By use of a pulmotor the lungs also were made to function seventeen minutes later.

Dunstaffnage Creamery

The annual meeting of the Dunstaffnage Cheese and Butter Company was held at the Dunstaffnage Creamery on the 17th day of January. The meeting was largely attended by patrons and shareholders. The President, A. C. MacAulay called the meeting to order at 2 o'clock p. m. The minutes of the past annual meeting was read and adopted. The President then gave a statement showing the good financial standing of the Company. The Secretary followed with his report which was unanimously adopted. The auditors report was then read showing the books to be in first class order. The President reported that he had attended a meeting of the Provincial Dairyman's Association which was held in Charlottetown on February 2, 24th. A. D. 1922 and as requested, layed the matter of "all the Dairy Companies, purchasing dairy supplies co-operatively, but up to the present time nothing has been done in this line. Mr. Morrow, the Butter and Cheese Inspector being present at the meeting reported that he had interviewed Mr. Grady, the Superintendent of the Prince Edward Island Railway, as requested at the last annual meeting, concerning the lowering of freight rates on cream, butter and all dairy products and in answer to Mr. Morrow's request Mr. Grady stated that the freight rates in this Province was the same as in all the Provinces of Canada. The Superintendent, however, kindly promised to give the matter his attention, to see if anything could be done to better conditions.

Mr. Morrow gave a very interesting and instructive lecture on the necessity of keeping the cream sweet, preserving the flavor and also pasteurizing the cream in order to manufacture a high grade of butter to be able to compete and hold our already gained reputation in the butter markets of Canada.

On motion moved, seconded and carried the following officers were elected for the ensuing year. President A. C. MacAulay; Directors, Wesley Mithew, J. R. Munn, A. C. Foster, James Hughes, S. C. Stewart and John Siltson.

Mr. A. A. McBeth was appointed Auditor for the present year. On motion, seconded and adopted the Directors were empowered with the fixing of the manufacturing price in order to have the affairs of the Company carried on, on sound basis.

Mr. J. R. Munn was appointed to represent the Company at the meeting of the Central Dairy Association. The Dunstaffnage Cheese and Butter Company having 546 patrons supplying cream and have manufactured 224,505 lbs. of butter during the year, the gross value of the year's output was \$79,199.31. The highest paid patrons realized over \$900.00. The next in order received over \$700.00. The third highest received over \$600.00. A great many received sums ranging between \$400.00 and \$500.00.

Mr. W. E. Wood who has been manager of the Company for a number of years, has, by his competent management gained the confidence of the patrons, directors and all concerned.

The Directors would ask all the patrons as well as all those who intend to supply cream this season to pay strict attention to the "caring of Cream" as a regulation has been passed at Ottawa on the tenth of March, providing for the grading of all Canadian Creamery Butter. (Patriot Please Copy)

DEPOPULATION IN RURAL QUEBEC

OTTAWA, April 13.—That the province of Quebec in common with other provinces was suffering from rural depopulation was asserted at the afternoon session of the parliamentary committee enquiring into agricultural conditions by Professor G. Toupin, of the agricultural college at Oka, Que.

Low wages paid farmers had always been the cause of a movement citywards and today that movement was still more marked.

Melville Cumming, of Truro N. S., gave evidence as to difficulties encountered by farmers in his province. He claimed that "apple" growers in the Annapolis Valley last season were operating at a loss of about twenty-five cents a barrel.
