Forest Fires Most Devastating... OTTAWA, June 12.—The meaning of the sudden outbreak of forest fires in Ontario and parts of Quebec recently is that the limited remaining supply of timber in Eastern Canada has dropped several notches lower and the "franchise" of 5,000 industries has been substantially shortened. This is the gist of a statement made the other day by the Canadian Forestry Association.
