(Canadian Press) DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 5.—The seventh attempt of a challenger to lift the Harmsworth Trophy failed today—as have all others in the last decade—in the disabling of the challenging craft, Miss England 3rd piloted by Kaye Don.

Don, plainly disappointed at the failure of his craft, showed himself a good loser. He congratulated Wood and said: "I am deeply disappointed since I feel that I have disappointed many thousands by not making a good contest in today's heat."

DETROIT, Sept. 4.—Having directed more than 24 hours of labor on his disabled challenger, Miss England III Kaye Don, British speed ace, announced tonight he and his craft were ready to meet Gar Wood and his Miss America X in the second heat of the Harmsworth trophy race.

Don crossed the finish line at a speed of less than 50 miles an hour as compared with his opening lap of 88.65 miles an hour. Barring further mishap the second heat is expected to find both Wood and Don prepared to push their boats to a much greater speed than yesterday's winning average of 78.489 miles an hour.

FAVORITE WINS TEN MILE RUN

Roy Oliver Of Thorburn, N. S., Leads Field Of Eleven, Wallace Rodd, Highfield, Second, And Noel Paul, Springhill Third, Time 54 Min. 19 Secs.

Running rhythmically and at steady clip Roy Oliver of Thorburn, N. S. won the Kelly and McInnis modified marathon last evening in the excellent time of 54:19. This mark if not a record comes close to the fastest time clocked in years.

A large crowd numbering approximately 7000 lined the route along Great George Street and cheered the eleven starters, ten of whom finished, McEwen of Morell being forced out on account of cramps early in the race.

Hugh Campbell of Graham's Road who won the five mile race at the Labor Union Sports, in the afternoon, finished in fifth position in the ten mile run.

The spectators were kept informed of the progress of the runners and excitement was at a high pitch at the finish. At the two mile mark Oliver was leading by about 25 yards, Paul second and Rodd third closely followed by B. McEachern and Herrel.

At the three mile mark Oliver had increased his lead to 100 yards; Paul and Rodd were running almost neck and neck; Ben McEachern, Warren and McEwen were bunched. At the five mile mark, Oliver had increased his lead 200 yards.

Paul second, Rodd third two yards behind Paul; Campbell and B. McEachern were 200 yards behind Rodd. At the seven mile mark Oliver had lengthened his lead to 400 yards, Paul second, Rodd third, Campbell fourth and McEachern fifth.

On the last three miles Paul and Rodd opened out to cut down the comfortable lead Oliver had set, but at no time were they a serious threat to the Thorburn lad who maintained the same piston-like stride throughout, and who finished miraculously fresh. Rodd barely nosed out Paul in a hard finish.
