SIR JOSEPH'S PROPOSAL REJECTED IN LONDON

LONDON, May 26.—The Imperial Conference, holding its sessions at the British Foreign Office turned down the proposal of Sir Joseph Ward, Premier of New Zealand, favoring the construction of an Imperial Council of State, with representatives of all the self-governing British Dominions to act in an advisory capacity to the Imperial government.

TOBACCO MAGNATE'S WIFE LOST AT SEA

SEATTLE, Wash., May 21.—According to wireless received today at Victoria (B. C.), when the Tamba Maru of the Nippon-Yusen Kaisha line arrives Wednesday or Thursday from the Orient the liner will have to report the loss of one of her saloon passengers, Mrs. J. W. Sneed, of New York, wife of the manager of the British American Tobacco Trust, who is on his way to New York with his bereaved family of two grown-up daughters and two sons.

The tragedy occurred when the Tamba Maru was 155 miles out from Shanghai, where the family had embarked. The younger members of the family were in the social cabin singing together when the mother was drowned, and did not know of it until the following morning.

Mr. and Mrs. Sneed, whose cabin was at some distance from that of the retired early, and Mrs. Sneed was not missed until 3.40 a. m., when her husband awakened to find her gone. Whether she fell or was thrown overboard is a question. It is the theory of some of the passengers that she walked to her sleep and fell over the gangway, only partially secured. Some think she left her cabin to see to her daughter's comfort.

FEARED BRITISH STEAMER HAS FOUNDERED

LONDON, May 23.—The British armored cruiser Cumberland today reported by wireless telegraph to the Admiralty that she had picked up at the mouth of the English Channel an empty lifeboat belonging to the overdue British steamer Cayo Largo. The vessel left Swansea April 16th for Tampico and a United States Gulf port and it is feared she foundered in the storm which followed her departure from the Welsh port. The steamer Cayo Largo was built at South Shields in 1898. She was 346 feet long, 45 feet beam and 17 feet deep. She was of 2223 tons net register, and was owned by the Cuban Steamship Company of London.

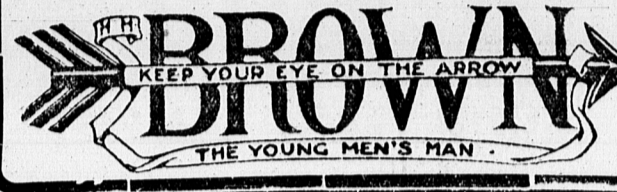
