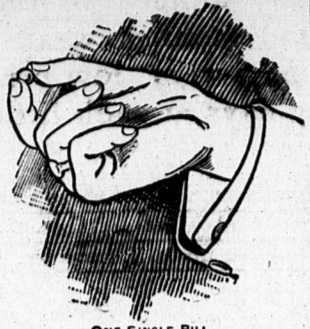

Edgett, Moncton, arrived in Summerside yesterday, having crossed by the Capes, and will until the opening of navigation, and in all probability throughout the most of the summer, take charge of the Edgett Grady Co's warehouse work and shipping.—8.

—Mussel mud hauling is now on in Mill River and Cascumpeque Ferry. Every day sees the ice lively with teams. One would think that after the severe frost this winter that the ice on the mud beds would be safe for many weeks yet. This may be a fact on the rivers but at Cascumpeque Ferry on Monday a digger and a team broke through. Fortunately there was only about one foot of water and no injury was caused only a man received a slight wetting. A.

—The marriage took place in the R. C. Church at Miscouche on Tuesday morning, the Rev. M. Monaghan officiating, of Miss Fannie Jurke and Louis McMillan, both of Miscouche. The bride was attended by Miss Eva Murphy, Summerside, while Frank McDonald, Grand River, supported the groom. —In the voting at the civic election in Summerside on Tuesday last the usual number of different combinations in voting were to be found. There were in all 947 ballots cast, seven of which were spoiled. Of these there were "77 plumpers," McLellan getting forty-six of them, Brace nineteen, Monkley nine, Gough two, and Holman one. There were only nine voters who were fortunate in having their candidates elected. McLellan, Holman and Brace. Twenty-eight dropped McLellan and voted for Monkley, while 77 dropped Brace and took on Monkley instead, twenty-eight others dropped Holman and took on Monkley. One hundred and three voters voted only for two candidates, thirty of whom voted for Holman and McLellan, twenty-three for McLellan and Monkley, ten for Brace and McLellan, eight for Brace and Holman, seven for Brace and Monkley, six for Gough and McLellan, six for Brace and Gough, four for Holman and Monkley, three for Gough and Monkley, three for Holman and Gough, two for Grady and McLellan and one for Grady and Holman. There were twenty-seven who voted for Brace, Gough and Holman, while twenty others dropped Holman and took on Monkley, McLellan and Gough, Brace and Gough, thirty others for Gough, McLellan and Holman, while ten voted for Gough, Holman and Monkley. Thirty others voted for Gough, McLellan and Monkley. Samson Grady, who announced his withdrawal from the contest the day after nomination, received eight votes, four on ballots with Holman and McLellan, one with Gough and Holman, two with McLellan and one with Holman. There were in all about twenty-nine different combinations of voting. In thirteen of them, Holman in eleven, Monkley and Brace in eleven, Gough in twelve and Grady in four.—8.

CUTS 14 CORDS AT AGE OF 86

GREAT BARRINGTON, Feb. 26.—George Spoor, aged 86, living in the Glendale, near here, claims to be the champion veteran woodchopper of Hampden county.

Last week he cut, chopped and split 14 cords of kindlings, and on Saturday afternoon devoted all his time in piling the wood in his barn.

The wood included oak, maple and pine slabs. The feat he accomplished is the talk of the country.

A total abstainer from liquor, and seldom using tobacco, the old man, tall and slim, but of herculean strength, started in last Monday to make a record week-chopping feat that would surpass one of 20 cords he made in other days.

Though he failed by six cords, the old man is well satisfied with his efforts, as he hasn't handled an axe in years.

Starting in on the woodlot last Monday, the old chopper cut two cords of wood and the next day increased that by half a cord more. On Wednesday he split three cords and the next day cut two cords. Friday the old man failed to cut more than two and a half cords, and on Saturday cut two cords.

He now maintains that he is the champion veteran woodchopper of the country and is willing to defend his title against all comers.
