Shot in hip While curling; Is mystery

TORONTO, Feb. 16.—(CP)—Police were engaged in intensive investigation tonight in an attempt to discover who, if anyone, fired a .22 calibre bullet which wounded Dr. Henry Hudson, Timmins dentist, on the right hip while he was curling in an Ontario Curling Association bonspiel match a few minutes after 6 p.m.

A search of persons in the Royal Canadian Curling Club rink, where the shooting occurred, revealed no sign of a gun or an exploded cartridge, police said. They are investigating three possibilities: That the cartridge exploded in some way while carried loose in someone's pocket; that it dropped from someone's pocket and exploded when it hit the ice or when it was struck by a curling rock; or that it was shot through windows at the north end of the rink, an estimated 20 feet above the ice surface.

Dr. Hudson is vice-skip on a rink skipped by his brother, Dr. Lew Hudson of Timmins. When the shooting occurred, the score in a Birks-Ellis-Ryrie preliminary round game was 8-8 on the 10th end.

Witnesses said Dr. Hudson was standing with his right side to the rink's northern windows after delivering a rock, when he straightened suddenly and exclaimed: "I've been shot!"

Belief was spurring to the ice, and Dr. Hudson was taken into the clubrooms and then to hospital. Dr. Roy Thomas said later an X-ray was taken, but that no attempt was made to remove the bullet. He said Dr. Hudson was "all right," but would remain in hospital a few days.

Police said the shot was not heard. Several matches were in progress at the time. All were stopped by police, and a search of everyone in the rink was made before the ice surface was examined for possible signs of an exploded cartridge.

Keeping the linen closet well stocked is the modern housewife's pride just as it was her grandmother's. And it shows are in the offering, taking care of what on hand is most important. Proper laundering probably ranks first. Clothes should not become too soiled, so as to necessitate rigorous rubbing, harsh soaps or strong bleaches. Tears and rins are safest mended before laundering. Table linens and bed linens too should not be folded in the same manner each time they are pressed. Alternate folding into thirds one time, quarters the next. Press very lightly along folds so that the creases will not become sharp and the fabric weakened.
