When the new constitution of the Irish Free State came into force at the end of 1937, and the Free State became known as "Eire" there were no public celebrations, but Mr. de Valera and his Ministers attended a vote mass at Dublin Pro-Cathedral. 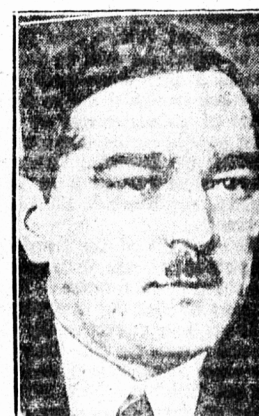

He will be away 11 weeks and in that time will fly by way of New York, Miami, Nassau (Bahamas), Kingston (Jamaica), San Juan (Porto Rico), Port of Spain (Trinidad), Bridgetown (Barbados), Georgetown (British Guiana), Belem (Brazil), Recife (Brazil), Rio de Janeiro (Brazil), Buenos Aires (Argentina), Santiago (Chile), Arica (Chile), Guayaquil (Ecuador), Cristobal (Canal Zone), Guatemala City (Guatemala), Mexico City (Mexico), Los Angeles and San Francisco before flying across the United States to New York and thence to Montreal. Mr. Holland is shown holding his ticket in his left hand which is the longest piece of aerial transportation ever issued.

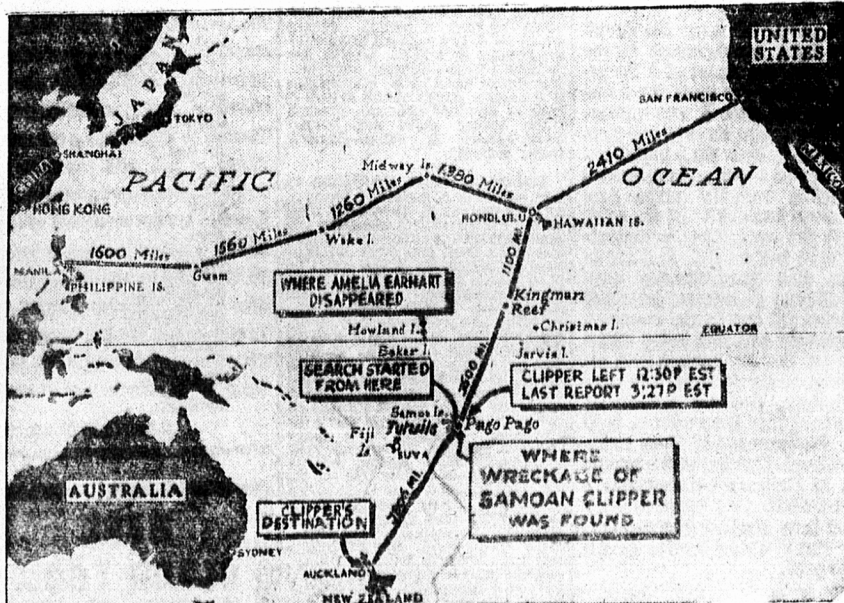
