through the press for accepting the nomination, but he could present a record that he was proud of as a city official. He eulogized the United Farmers in Ontario and defended the action of the strikers, who, he said, had as much right to sell their labor as other men to sell their goods. "We blow about the freedom of the country we live in and yet we criticised men for striking," he argued, concluding with a good humored appeal for an appeal to try a Labor candidate for once.

**Mr. J. H. Myers.**  
Mr. J. H. Myers expressed his pleasure at seeing so many ladies present. The ladies have certainly won their franchise during the war (Applause) and the recent election at New Brunswick is sufficient proof that they can employ it wisely. Mr. Brown had a lot to say at previous meetings about that Conservative nomination where he was turned down by a "political machine." There were some 55 delegates from Belfast district at that convention and he believed it would be a pretty hard job for an "machine" in Charlottetown to try to manipulate the actions of these men (applause). Mr. Brown also declared he was ashamed to have voted for the Union Government. The speaker believed there were men in the hall who also supported that Government and who will regret the insinuations of Mr. Brown along this line. (Applause.)

**Mr. Brown read at every meeting** the criticism of the Examiner upon his nomination so often that Mr. Myers believed he had it nearly by heart. It began "if it was a horse race, D. George, Esq., and C. H. B. Longworth, Esq. The speakers also commented favorably on the performances of those taking part.

**Mr. J. E. Sinclair**  
Mr. J. E. Sinclair the next speaker maintained that issues other than the tariff require careful con-

sideration and must be taken into account. Many expenditures have taken place under the guise of war expenditures which must be explained by the government he said.

He repeated his criticism of Board of Railway Management made at previous meetings, denouncing its withdrawal from parliamentary control as a breach of constitutional government. With regard to railway insurance he considered it cheaper to pay fire losses than to pay insurance for the whole lines of railway. He criticized the letting of the railway contracts and maintained that the railways are not being kept out of politics as Mr. Hanna has affirmed. In looking at this tariff from the standpoint of the eastern provinces protection is no policy for us, continued Mr. Sinclair if we get into the United States without a duty we have a good pork market; and in this line we have nothing to fear from competition as we have a superior product.

Referring to the Fordney Tariff Bill he maintained that it was very doubtful if whether the bill would really pass. It should be in the interests of maritime people to support a tariff that will be reduced to the lowest possible point. In regard to the operation of the Merchant Marine Mr. Sinclair did not wish to say much. It was in the extravagant construction of them that his chief objection lay. A proper sale Merchant Marine policy would be a good thing for Canada, but the Government has been building a Merchant Marine without a policy. He charged that the result of building the Merchant Marine meant the spending of \$78,000,000 on ships.

Mr. Sinclair concluded by criticizing the granting of the Romanian loan which was manipulated by big Canadian firms contracting for ploughs and other things.

**Mr. Donald McKinnon Replies**  
Mr. Donald McKinnon speaking briefly at the conclusion of the meeting definitely brought to a point the tariff issue and triumphantly answered the charges made by the Liberal candidates regarding the Roumanian Loan and other points. The logic of his arguments were obvious and the applause with which they were greeted by the audience plainly indicated that his remarks were not lost astray by the evasive answers given by Messrs. Sinclair and McKinnon who betrayed a desire to switch the subject of the tariff issue into some other channel. Mr. McKinnon took up first the issue raised by Mr. Sinclair regarding Canadian ploughs and foodstuffs which had been sent as a war loan to Roumania and which he insinuated had been done to benefit certain large manufacturers. "We know that Roumania was one of Britain's treaty allies from the earliest days of the war," said Mr. McKinnon and added "She was surrounded by enemies and cut off from food supplies. She asked Canada for the means to till her soil and feed her starving people and among other things Canada sent her those ploughs. They were not sent at the expense of Canada but merely a loan and the money will all be returned with interest when Roumania gets upon her feet again. These gentlemen are indeed hard up for arguments when they take it upon them to criticize Canada's generous response to Roumania. (Applause.)

Mr. Sinclair, "Put on a revenue tariff."  
Mr. McKinnon—What is that going to be? Is it going to be 14 per cent. less or more?  
Mr. Sinclair—What is your protection tariff going to be?  
Some discussion took place as to the actual percentage of the tariff. Mr. Sinclair contending it was 16 per cent.  
Mr. McKinnon—All right, let it go at 16 per cent! Will you dare to say that you intend to run this country on less?  
After waiting in vain for a definite answer to this question Mr. McKinnon concluded triumphantly: "I think I have to say, and I think I can say it truthfully that so far as the Liberal party is concerned they have not yet shown to the electors of this country what their policy is in regard to running the affairs of the country." (Applause.)

Before the meeting concluded Mr. J. B. Morrissey spoke about the necessity of the erection of a bridge across Orwell River which is a very important matter to the people of Belfast district. A petition had been presented to the local House and it was overlooked. They did not forget to raise their own affairs, though (Applause.)
