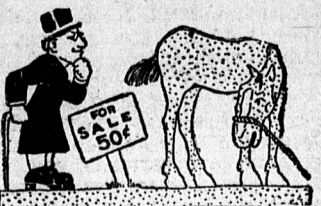

FOX MEETING.—It is the intention of the "fox parliament" committee to resume their work on Wednesday, when they will meet at 230 The National, where a business was disposed of at the last session of the committee, various matters of interest having been thoroughly discussed.

POINT PRIM.—The half yearly examination of Point Prim School took place on Friday, the 28th. The large number of parents and visitors present shows the keen interest which the people are taking in the advancement of education. The pupils were examined by their teacher, Miss Catherine Campbell, assisted by the parents. Their scores were as follows: that they have been receiving a very careful training. After the examination a programme consisting of songs, readings and recitations was splendidly rendered by the pupils. Candy was then passed around. The meeting was brought to a close by singing the National Anthem. All expressing themselves well pleased with the progress of the school.

EXAMINATION.—The semi annual examination of Meadow Bank School was held on Jan. 27th and was largely attended by ratepayers and visitors. The pupils were examined in the various subjects by the visiting teachers, Miss McDonald and Mr. Neil McCannell, assisted by their own teacher, Mr. John E. Hoertz; and showed by their ready answers that they are being well taught. Complimentary remarks were made by the trustees and visitors as to the progress of the pupils and the appearance of the school room, both of which are certainly a credit to the district. A vote of thanks was then tendered the visiting teachers for helping to make the examination such a success and the proceedings were brought to a close by singing God Save the King.

AGRICULTURAL CONFERENCE.—On Tuesday, January 26th an Agricultural Conference was held at Wilmot Valley. A large audience from the locality and surrounding districts was in attendance. The speaker Prof. W. J. Reid, addressed the meeting on the need and possibilities for an increased production of Live Stock products throughout the Province. The first part of the meeting was given to the explanation of the necessity of this in promoting the Dominion to stimulate an increase of Agricultural production. The need of the United Kingdom under average conditions was given, and the present demand will increase the needs beyond our average production. For the increase of prices will be in keeping for some years to come. A review of the present standing of each class of stock was given, and the possibilities of a provincial improvement of each was discussed. Horses formed a prominent part of this discussion. The speaker pointed out that the present type of horse while not being of the desirable type for war purposes is of a suitable type to fill our own demands, and from this standpoint it should be fostered. Breeding and care were discussed at length. Beef Cattle has been receiving more recognition of late than ever before, and, for those who adopt this class, the profit will be better than in the past. The relative merits of the distinctly fat type and the dual purpose type were discussed. The dairy herds of the Province should not be neglected for the reason that butter and cheese are commanding good prices, and those will be maintained for some time. The swine industry was discussed in favor of an increase being kept, for which the prices would be commensurate. During the last season the expected high price did not show for the reason that there was a rust in marketing. At present there is prospect for a broader market in the needs of Great Britain, but it will not be filled according to the present number of breeding stock. The Sheep industry of the Province was cited as improving in number and quality. More interest is being shown in the improvement of Pure Bred Sires, and better general care, which includes dipping and better preparation for years have been improving, last season being the highest on record. During the next few seasons equal prices can be expected. In general, the prospect is bright for the Live Stock men of the Province, and, with the present need, there should be effort in this direction.

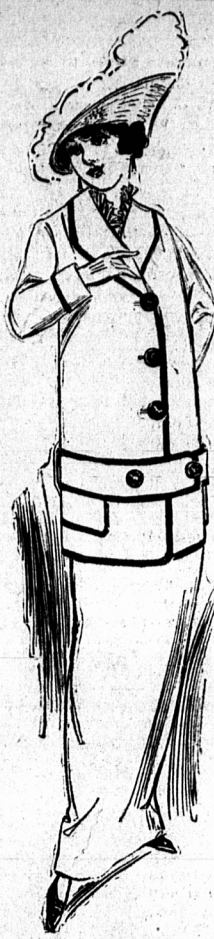
