BUSINESS AS USUAL.—The Toronto News of recent date referring to trade and industrial conditions in Canada under war conditions, corrects the current rumor that, owing to the general depression, the Massey-Harris Company had closed its Ontario factories. The News says "Though it has been supposed by most people that the Massey-Harris works has been closed down tight, the Company has been employing no fewer than 1500 men weekly for the past eight weeks in its Canadian works. Many of these have been engaged on the filling of an order of 2000 transport wagons for the Imperial Government. The last shipment of which will be made sometime this week. These wagons were on the Company's Woodstock works which have been working day and night since the order was received. Large numbers of employees from Toronto and Bradford having been drafted there to assist in the work." HORSES FOR ARMY.—Mr. W. S. McKie, Charlottetown, will leave by the Northumberland this morning for Halifax in charge of the 20 horses purchased there by Capt. Willett and Lieut. Reavey, members of the Remount Commission for the British artillery.

SAILED FOR FRANCE.—The s.s. Morven, agent Burnside Bell & Co., loaded with 30,000 bushels of oats, part of the P.E. Island contribution to the Army Field Fund, sailed from the railway wharf, where she was loaded, Saturday afternoon. Mr. McLean sailed with the steamer as supercargo, and Mr. George Burnside, of Mr. H. V. Buntain, as a passenger on a cruise to La Havre.

VICTORIA DIVISION, S. OF T. had another interesting meeting on Friday night last. Rev. W. D. Wilson, Field Secretary of the Temperance Alliance, gave an instructive address and presented members of the Division with copies of the proposed amendments to the Prohibition Act. A discussion followed upon various phases of temperance work in which encouraging reports of the educational campaign in different parts of the province was an important topic. The customary literary and musical programme was also much enjoyed. On account of the last night of the quarter falling on Christmas Eve, it was decided to hold the election of officers on Friday next, a week earlier than usual.

FROM ST. JOHN.—The following letter was received on the 10th, by Capt. McNeil, from one of the boys at St. John: "Dear Sir—Just a few lines to let you know how we are getting along. The Charlottetown boys are a credit to P. E. Island, everyone 'on the keg.' We get it pretty hard here. From 9 a. m. to 12 p. m. we have physical drill and from 2 to 4 p. m. we go on a tennis match. We are certainly getting hardened up. I know you will get a surprise when I tell you that Ernest White and John McLean, the old soldiers, have got two strips (full corporals). Ernest White is in No. 3 section. I am in No. 2 section. We mean the P. E. Islanders are on the list for the front. There were about 200 discharged in the 26th Battalion. There were only two Islanders that did not pass. Ernest White and John McLean are on the machine guns."

ISLAND WINNERS.—A strong feature of the Maritime Fair stock show at Amherst just closed was the exhibit of Yorkshire swine. This breed was represented by three exhibitors from P. E. I. Mr. J. W. Gallant, Summerside; Mr. A. McBeath, Marshfield, and Stewart Bros., Alliston, who won practically every prize offered. The Judge Mr. J. Platt of Hamilton, Ont., who has judged at all the leading shows throughout the Dominion remarked that it was the best he ever officiated. The closed competition was between Mr. Calbeck of Summerside and Mr. McBeath of Marshfield both herds were in the best of condition and were a credit to the owners. Mr. Calbeck won the herd prize a valuable silver cup which is the Grand Championship over all breeds of swine at the show.
