A St. John despatch says:—The cutting in price of flour which brings joy to the heart of the bread-winner, goes merrily on. Tuesday morning saw the price of Ogilvie mills Manitoba flour drop suddenly from \$6.40 per barrel retail to \$6.20 per barrel. On Tuesday evening came word that the latter flour had been reduced to \$5.50 retail. Not to be outdone, the Ogilvie people again sent their prices downwards. This morning the Ogilvie flour is selling at \$5.80 per barrel. The dealers are watching the battle of prices most eagerly, and various are the conjectures as to how far the war, for so the competition in prices may be styled, will go before prices begin to climb upward again. Meanwhile dealers who bought when the flour was high are not at all pleased with themselves. Ontario flour also took a drop today. It is now selling at \$5 retail. On Tuesday it sold at \$5.10.

THERE is not so much demand for hay owing to the large crop of oats and the lower figures consequent thereon. Prices in the Upper Province markets are steadily declining, sales of No. 2 white hay being made in Montreal last week as low as 35 cents. The outlook is for low prices in hay. The English crop was about 25 per cent. short, but to make up for this the farmers there have about a similar amount of last year's crop carried over. In Quebec there is said to be about 20 per cent. of last year's crop still in the hands of the farmers and this year's crops are bumper ones all around. In New York prices are below a point where it will pay to ship to that market. The outlook all around, therefore, is for lower prices.—Halifax Chronicle.

An Antigonish Despatch speaking of the St. Francis Xavier celebration says:—The baccalaureate sermon was delivered by Right Rev. Dr. Morrison, of Charlottetown, and was a masterpiece. The Rev. gentleman took as his text the following from Eccl. "Let us now praise men of renown and our fathers in their generation such as have borne rule in their domains, and by the strength of wisdom instructing the people in most holy words. Let the people show forth their wisdom, and the church declare their praise." The preacher dwelt on the importance of an education which attended not only to man's intellectual faculties, but to those of the moral order as well. An education which neglected the moral aspect was only one-sided, and while it might make a man clever in material pursuits, would not be conducive to his permanent welfare, nor to that of the community. St. Francis Xavier's, during the past fifty years, clearly showed that she well understood the noble mission assigned to her. She has ever been alive to every requirement tending towards intellectual development, and simultaneously has she taught those wise and ennobling principles of morality which form the foundation of public and private rectitude. In concluding the preacher, in an eloquent manner congratulated Bishop Cameron, the clergy of the diocese, and the people on the grand and auspicious occasion which commemorates those fifty long years of earnest devotion to the sacred work of education.
