

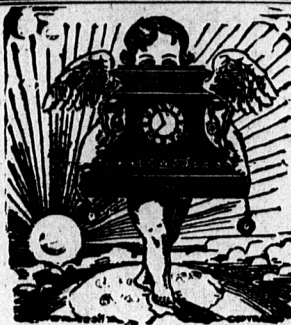

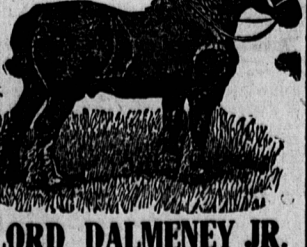

The untimely death of William Murray, jr., son of William Murray baker, of Charlottetown which occurred at his home in this city at 11.30 o'clock Thursday night, is a matter of deep regret. Numerous friends will be sorry indeed to learn the sad news. The deceased was a man of magnificent physique, and up to two years ago enjoyed the best of health. The two last years of his life were years of anxiety and suffering, following a series of operations abroad for a trouble which apparently originated with an ulcerated tooth. The late Mr. Murray was in his 49th year and like his father was a baker by trade. He took a great interest in athletics and was well-known as one of the greatest cricket players this city has produced. He was an honorary member of the Charlottetown Fire Department and some years ago figured conspicuously on the championship teams sent by this city to Halifax. He was an exceptional well informed man on topics of the world-wide interest and was exceptionally well posted on naval and military affairs. To his sorrowful father, his brother, Dr. J. P. Murray and his sister, Miss Mary Murray much sympathy will be extended in their sad bereavement. The funeral will take place tomorrow at 2.4 p.m.

The high legs fitted with castors enable it to run smoothly, easily and noiselessly from place to place. This refrigerator is something new and the fact that it can be made in this Province at comparatively low cost should interest the attention of promoters and the buying public from the state of neglect toward home industries that is the prime cause for the decreasing population. This is the year to boost Prince Edward Island, the year to boom Charlottetown and our local industries and here is a splendid chance to assist Mr. McEachern, the ingenious inventor and expert mechanic and in doing so boom local industry.

**MORELL AND FISH**

The fishermen of Morell are doing things these days. Early and late, these hardy sons of toil are busy trying to make an honest dollar. Too often, have their labors been but poorly rewarded but if the present "good luck" continues, many here will be on "easy street." Today between 15,000 and 20,000 mackerel were landed by the local fleet and the fish were beauties--every one a bloater. Part of this lot was sold to local buyers at 7c each and the balance were sailed. This morning 140 barrels were shipped to Boston by express in ice where the price just now is good. The shippers here are H. H. Cox and Cox Bros., Baker & McEwen; The McGrath Bros; Stafford & Coffin; Drake & Hume; Eldershaw & Blaxland and Capt. Geldert are some of the fishermen who did exceptionally well.

When the car-ferry is working and refrigerator cars can be loaded here and opened in Boston, Montreal or Winnipeg it will mean a great boom to our fishermen. The expense of barrels, etc., is very high and must come off the price of the fish. The expressage alone on these 140 barrels to Boston today was \$504. With the car-ferry in sight we see better things in store for us. Our fisheries are the best on the whole Atlantic coast but we have been unable to get them to the market. When proper carriage can be arranged and connections made with dealers in Western Canada, the demand will be enormous. This business alone justifies the car-ferry and the Government are entitled to the thanks of the fishermen for this boon. People of the West should also thank the Government or enabling them to get this "brain food" from the "Garden of the Gulf." If doctors would give "microbes" and "bugs" a rest and talk fish a while, it would be a good thing for the next generation. Fish food is brain food and a whole lot more. Nova Scotia and P. E. I. are noted for their "brain men and women." The reason is "Good ancestors and fish." Our young people generally are found in the front rank at college and in the professions and Legislative Halls they have few superiors. There is a reason. When the car-ferry is complete, our Western cousins can share with us in this "elixir" and thus keep up the standard of "briny Canadians."

But we are now speaking only of mackerel. With our salmon, cod, haddock; herring; smelts; lobsters; quahaugs; clams; oysters, &c., &c., all that is required is the ferry and men here and in the West to handle and distribute. Our fishermen will do the rest. They know their business and are right on to their job. Although our streams and ponds are full of trout we did not mention them for the reason that we do not look upon this fish from a commercial standpoint. They are more useful to supply amusement to "trout-keepers" and boys, or men of leisure and enable them to tell exaggerated stories of the size of the fish they did not land. The fisheries that I have referred to are of a more serious nature forming the means of livelihood of thousands of our most hardy and useful people and their usually large families. These people must be looked after if this country is ever to take its place among the nations and have a navy of her own. These fishermen and their lads are the very best material to man our man-of-wars.

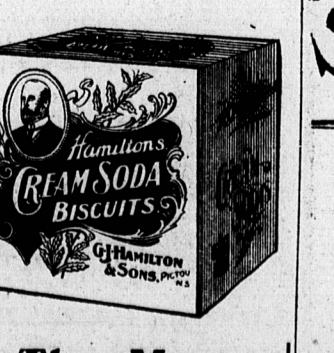
