P. E. I. HAY ARRIVES IN FRANCE.—Harbor Master Joseph Ryan of Charlottetown received word by mail yesterday of the safe arrival in Cherbourg, France, of the S. S. Petani, the large steamship which loaded at this port by Carvell Bros. some weeks ago with hay for the British Army. Owing to the censorship it was impossible to say anything at the time of the presence of the Petani at this port or of her sailing. It will be pleasing intelligence to all to learn that the ship with her valuable cargo arrived safely despite the dangers of submarines and mines. The letter received by Mr. Ryan was from the commander of the ship, Captain Lawson who states that fog was experienced, for the first five days out but after the weather was fine. The captain states that there had been considerable submarine activity on the part of the enemy at the time of his arrival but they very fortunately saw none.

UNACCOMMODATED VISITORS.—There has been such a rush of visitors to Charlottetown for the exhibition that nearly every hotel and boarding house is filled to its capacity. Last night many passengers by the Car Ferry steamer discovered this to their chagrin. They landed and visited one hotel after another only to be met with the reply "full-up," and on enquiring where they could possibly find a place for the night were answered in the negative. Ultimately they had to retrace their steps to the steamer and beg for permission to remain on board for the night. This is not as it should be. There are many private houses that would willingly accommodate visitors on such an occasion if invited to register, and some representatives of the Exhibition Committee, the Board of Trade, or the Merchant's Association should be on hand at the steamer and trains to provide the necessary information. It does not tend to popularize Charlottetown with visitors to bring them all the way from the mainland and then leave them stranded at the wharf.
