That Car Of Yours

Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

HIGHWAYS ARE ALWAYS NEW

No matter how well one may know a road, it doesn't pay to take familiar curves and hills at too high a speed. One may know the physical features of a road perfectly, but traffic conditions always present an entirely new picture on any well traveled highway.

DON'T DARKEN THE DASH

It is a bad practice this one believes that you cannot drive so well when the dash light's rays are darting about in the driving compartment. There always is the chance that the oil pressure gauge or the ammeter will be registering trouble that might become serious before the driver realized it unless he has his dash light burning. Furthermore, the speedometer cannot be seen and one is robbed of all defense in event of arrest for speeding.

"HOW FAST" NOT THE BEST

Almost any car will climb the average "hard hill" in high if given a sufficient descent. The real test of power is how well they will pull with only a fair start or how well they will maintain an average speed on a comparatively difficult grade. Some of the men in giving power demonstrations "loose" the car on a hill so fast that the car would almost coast over the crest.

HERE'S WHY BRAKES BURN

It isn't merely excessive use that burns brake linings; wear is caused by using a defective brake on a car. When the brakes are called upon to do heavy work of this character, the drums become very hot and expand so that in effect, are applied beyond what the driver believes is the case. It is sufficient to pressure on the pedal from time to time during such a descent because the driver may not be aware of the fact that the brakes are "applying themselves" under excessive use.

GET AWAY FROM THE GLARE

Often it is possible to get away from glaring headlights by driving behind another car. The back of the first machine, reflects your own light's rays and affords a very handy guide. It might pay to try this scheme some dark rainy night.

BEWARE THE STRONG MAN

Just because the mechanic is a hefty individual is no reason why you should assume he is the ideal man to work on your car. What if your job called for the insertion of a valve after being ground in. It often is difficult to raise the valve springs to insert the pins in the stems. Some mechanics are inclined to hit a valve or force it. It may mean a bent valve and another job to be done.

FIRES CAN START EASILY

Carelessness in car repair work easily can result in fire. All car needs is a short circuit caused by metal contact between one of the electrical terminals and the "ground" (any metal part of the car). Take care which have floor boards edged with aluminum. Let one of the sides drop on a battery terminal and there's a spark. Let there be gasoline or oil near the spark and there's a fire.

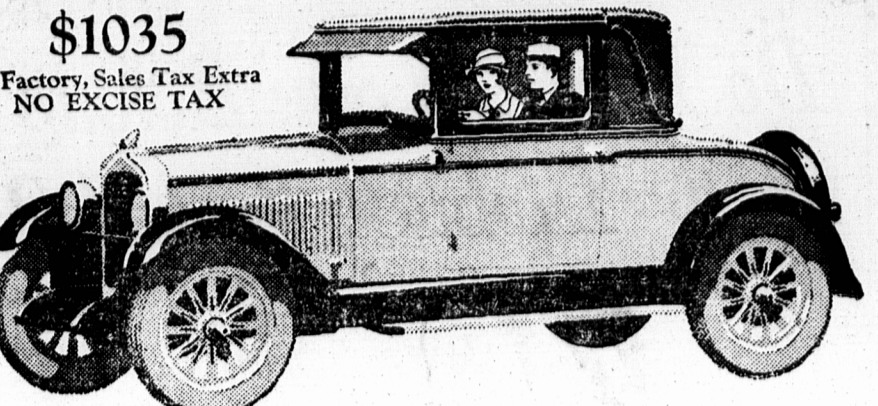
