## Giants Split Doubleheader With Pirates To Maintain 4 1/2 Game Lead Over Cards

NEW YORK, Sept. 16—(A.P.)—The Giants drew another step nearer the National League flag today, although getting only an even break in a doubleheader, marking their season finale against Pittsburgh Pirates.

Three hits and a walk in the fourth inning accounted for all the Giants' runs as they pulled out a 2-1 decision in the opener. Old Waite Hoyt had too much stuff for them in the nightcap and the Pirates won another pitching duel 4-3.

Since the second place Cards also split their two starts in Philadelphia the even break left the Giants 4 1/2 games in front with only 110 to play.

The Dodgers warming up for their stretch series with the league leading Giants at Brooklyn belted Cincinnati Reds in both ends of a doubleheader, 7-4 and 10-2.

A three-run rally off Gene Schott in the eighth sewed up the opener to give Fred Frankhouse his 11th victory of the season. Babe Herman hit a pinch homer with two on in the seventh to bring the Reds into a tie but it didn't stick.

In the nightcap Linnis Frey was the standout, driving in half a dozen runs with a single, double and triple.

At Philadelphia the Cardinals executed a triple play while losing the opener to the Phillies 7-3 but came back with a belated hitting parade in the nightcap to halve the twin bill, 5-2.

The triple killing came in the second inning and nipped a Phil's uprising. Camilli walked and went to second on Arnovich's single. Grace, in attempting to sacrifice, lined to Haines, who doubled Amherst at first base.

Mize rifled the ball to Durocher at second, catching Camilli off the sack for the third out.

Frequent clashes between players and umpires marked the games.

and Frankie Frisch, Durocher and Medwick were banished. The Cardinals' manager was dispatched to the dugout by Umpire Bill Klem for protesting too vigorously when the arbiter called Garibaldi out on a third strike in the third inning of the first game.

Bill Lee held the Bees to five hits, all singles in the second game, while the Cubs hit Bobby Smith hard. Herman had a perfect record at bat in the second game with four hits.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16—(A.P.)—Before the smallest crowd at Navin Field, Detroit, in three years, the Tigers defeated Philadelphia Athletics 6-2 today. Official attendance was 1,100.

Elden Auker, Tiger underhand twirler won his 12th victory of the year.

George Tebbets, Tiger rookie called in form the Beaumont club in the Texas League, caught the whole game. He drew two passes and hit a double.

At Cleveland Hal Trosky rifled his 41st home run of the season as the Indians bunched 14 hits to crush Boston Red Sox 13-3. The game was called because of rain at the end of the sixth inning.

The Tribe first baseman got his homer in the first inning and hit safely on three other trips to the plate. This brought his consecutive hits to nine—two short of Tris Speaker's major league record.

The great Toronto golfer was blasted from her sixth quest of the open title by Mrs. Thomas D. Ruder of New York 2 and 1 while the other favorites, red-headed Margery Kirkham of Montreal and pretty Marion Miley of Lexington, Ky., paraded through the second round.

Miss Miley shared the work of eliminating Western Canada's last hopefuls, defeating Barbara Northwood of Winnipeg 4 and 3, while Mrs. A. B. Darling of Montreal trounced Vancouver's Mrs. W. M. Silcock 7 and 6.

Miss Kirkham, the medalist, went around the trap-laden course in a fine exhibition of all-round shooting to eliminate Mrs. A. J. Wright of Montreal 5 and 4 and qualify to meet Marian McDougall of Portland, Ore., who swept past Mary Peech of Montreal with a 5 and 3 triumph.

GARDEN CITY N. Y., Sept. 16—(C.P.)—The old guard surrendered Garden City's celebrated golfing battleground today to the double-barreled charge of the youthful light brigade, gunning for the United States amateur championship.

The day's firing saw the last of the ex-champions pass from the picture, the field reduced from 64 to 16 survivors and such seasoned young campaigners as Omaha's Johnny Goodman, Seattle's Scotty Campbell and Cincinnati's Johnny Fischer, Walker Cup team-mates, riding the crest of the impressive shotmaking.

Little Joe Thompson of Hamilton was eliminated by his travelling host and old friend, Bill Holt Jr., of Syracuse, N. Y., 2 and 1. Jack Cameron roving veteran
