Hints for the Motorist

HAND FITTING OF RINGS

W. H. C. writes: A year ago, my engine began to leak oil and lose compression and I had new rings put in, but without much benefit as it now leaks worse than ever and has a very smoky exhaust. These rings were not ground in. Do you think that if a new set of rings were fitted in that way, existing conditions would be remedied? Engine has run 18,000 miles.

Answer: You better have your cylinders tested for roundness and uniformity of bore by a competent machinist and, if they are found much out of true or scored, have them turned up. If they are still fairly true and smooth, you better try a new set of rings, but not otherwise. The hand fitting of rings by bluing and filing until a bearing all around is obtained is very slow and expensive, probably nearly as costly as having the cylinders bored out. With true and perfect cylinders you ought to obtain a very good ring fit with stock rings, standard or oversize, without hand fitting. If they are put in with proper groove fit and end clearance and good round rings are used.

The Markets

MONTREAL, Feb. 16.—On account of the continued liberal receipts of eggs an easy feeling continues to prevail in the market, and prices were shaded another 1c per dozen today. The demand is improving some, which indicates that the consumption at the lower level is increasing, and a fairly active trade was done in new laid stock at 51c to 55c per dozen, f. o. b. Chicago, and it is reported that several cars are on the way here, while they were offered today at 31½c dozen, f. o. b. Chicago. It was also reported that dealers here were bidding Ontario shippers 42c per dozen f. o. b. shipping points for next week's shipments. The receipts today were 1,298 cases, as against 968 for the same day last week, and 513 for the corresponding day a year ago.

A good steady trade continues to be done in dressed poultry, and the market is fairly active with a firm undertone. The demand is principally from local buyers for small lots of cold storage stock, and a few orders are also coming to forward from outside points. Receipts of fresh-killed stock from the country are very light and far from being sufficient to satisfy the requirements of the trade.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows:

Turkeys, choice.....	60c to 62c
Good turkeys.....	55c to 57c
Geese.....	30c to 35c
Chickens.....	40c to 42c
Ducks.....	40c to 41c
Fowls.....	32c to 35c

There was no change in the condition of the market for potatoes today, prices being about steady, but the demand for car lots is still somewhat limited on account of the fact that dealers in most cases have supplies on hand for the time being, and sales of Green Mountains and Quebec stock were slow at 95c to \$1 per bag of 90 lbs. extra-kill, but the demand in a jobbing way was fair at \$1.20 to \$1.30 per bag of extra-kill.

CHICAGO, February 15.—Eggs lower. Receipts 15, 925 cases. At market cases included, 29c to 30c.

NEW YORK, February 15.—Eggs weak. Receipts 24,405 cases. Fresh gathered, extra firsts, 37c; fresh gathered, firsts, 35c to 36c; stable, Pennsylvania and nearby western henmy whites, firsts to extras, 47c to 50c; do. browns, extras, 39c to 40c; do. gathered browns and mixed colors, firsts to extras, 36c to 38c.

NEW YORK, February 15.—Hops easy. State, 1920, 38c to 42c; Pacific coast 1920, 27c to 31c; 1919, 24c to 26c.
