CANADA WINS WORLD AMATEUR HOCKEY TITLE

Dynamiters Register 2-1 Overtime Win Over Swiss; England Places Second

LONDON, Feb. 28.—(CP Cable)—Kimberley Dynamiters ranked tonight as world kings of amateur hockey. The squad that won the Allan Cup last spring, concluded its undefeated march through the world's amateur championship here Saturday with a 2-1 victory in overtime over Switzerland. England defeated Germany 5-0 to take the runner-up spot for the title the English squad won by its victory in the Olympic Games a year ago. The four teams survived two rounds of elimination and each team played the other once in the final. The Canadians had their work cut out to beat the Swiss who played the same brand of sterling hockey that took England to overtime in their match of last week.

IS OUTSTANDING

The Dynamiters' defence, headed by Bill Burnett, was outstanding, and the Canadians took a lead in the second period when "Puffy" Kemp beat goalie Albert Hirz. Switzerland tied the score on a goal by H. Lohrer, centre of the second line, before the period ended. The third was scoreless and George "Red" Goble gave Canada victory with a scoring shot in the first three minutes of overtime. More than 10,000 fans crowded Haringay Stadium for the match. Most were pulling for a Swiss victory which would have left Canada, England and Switzerland tied for the top position. Canada had defeated England 3-0 Friday. Much credit for the Canadian victory was given to Kenny Campbell, the goalie, who let in but four goals in nine victories. Jimmy Foster, the Moncton and English Olympic goalie, was beaten only three times, but all were in the vital Canada-England series.

Haynes Plays Big Role In Canuck Win

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Feb. 28.—It was Aurel Joliat night at the Forum here last night but Paul Haynes stole the show as Canadiens came from behind to whip New York Americans 3-2, in overtime, before 8,000 fans in a National Hockey League fixture.

Haynes scored two goals in the third period, the first on a pass from Babe Siebert and the second unassisted to draw Canadiens level with Amerks and send the game into overtime. With Joe Jerwa watching from the penalty bench, Haynes set up the winning play with Joliat for Johnny Gagnon to beat Alfie Moore with a looping shot from 20 feet out.

Joliat was the recipient of a silver tea service from his admirers to celebrate his 654th appearance in an N. H. L. game. Mayor Adhemar Reynault of Montreal and President Frank Calder of the N. H. L. made the presentation to the veteran left winger in an elaborate ceremony preceding the game.

Amerks had few scoring chances but they made the most of them in the first two sessions to snatch a two-goal lead. Lorne Carr slapped one past Willie Cude at 11:05 in the opening canto for the first score.

Play livened up a bit in the middle session with Canadiens driving for the equalizer but it was Americans who broke through for a score. Eddie Wiseman and Joe Lamb both Maritime-born players, batted at a loose puck in front of Cude and, after both had missed big Nels Stewart blasted it home to put Amerks ahead 2-0.

Canadiens power plays finally took effect in the third period, resulting in Haynes' two goals, and Jerwa's penalty in overtime paved the way for the winning point.

Leafs Defeat Maroons In Lively Game

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Feb. 28.—Toronto Maple Leafs won a 3-2 decision over Montreal Maroons here Saturday night in a National Hockey League game that had everything. The win brought Leafs within a point of Maroons, runners-up to Montreal Canadiens in the Canadian division.

The teams staged an old-time Maroon-Leaf battle that included a young riot and a pulse-quickenng finish that made the issue uncertain until the final gong rang and kept 13,331 fans on their toes. They even brought a spectator into the battling but he retired quickly with a split head.

Harvey Jackson, Leafs' ace left winger, won the game for them with two goals within 10 seconds while Bob Grace was serving a tripping penalty in the second period. Frank Finnigan scored his first goal of the season with a full mangle shot two minutes after Jackson's second goal. Maroon's two third period goals through Jerry Shannon and Herb Cain set the stage for a stirring finish.

The battle royal broke out in the third period after Red Horner and Lionel Conacher exchanged a few choice compliments. Charlie Conacher rushed between them as a peacemaker but other Maroons couldn't see it that way. Twenty-eight players of both sides wrestled, punched and shouted at each other for several minutes.

CHICAGO, Feb. 28.—(CP)—Chicago Black Hawks, squeezing out a 4-3 win over the New York Rangers, tonight kept their grasp on a faint mathematical chance to get into the National Hockey League playoffs.

Louis Trudell opened the scoring after a minute of play, Earl Siebert getting another Hawk goal late in the opening period.

In the second period New York knotted the count on goals by Alex Shibicky and Frank Boucher, but Trudell's second goal put Hawks in front again. In the final stanza Wildor Larochelle scored for Hawks and Ott Heller gave Rangers a third counter with Keeling and Neil Colville getting assists.

Rosemont, Favorite, Wins Santa Anita Handicap

SANTA ANITA PARK, Calif., Feb. 28.—Rosemont the favorite, captured the third running of the \$100,000 Santa Anita handicap Saturday in a brilliant chapter of turf history.

Records fell behind as the Foxcatcher Farm's big bay champion thundered under the wire to win from C. S. Howard's sensational Seabiscuit in a finish so close it took a photograph to decide the winner.

Major Austin C. Taylor's Indian Broom was third, and the Vancouver, B. C., sportsman's other candidate, Special Agent, ran fourth in the field of 18 starters.

Two other Canadian starters, Rushaway from the stable of A. G. Tarn of Winnipeg and Sabin from the Seagram stable of Waterloo, Ont., gave dull performances. The former finished 16th and Sabin last.

A record breaking crowd of more than 500,000 crammed Santa Anita's famed racing plant for the festivities, spending more than \$1,000,000 through the betting mills during the day and \$396,553 on the feature race alone.

A mighty roar echoed back from the faded blue Sierra Madre Mountains as the charging brigade rounded the track in a 1 1/4 mile dash for the richest turf prize on the continent.

Jockey Harry Richards brought Rosemont from behind as they neared the far turn, and with Seabiscuit, Special Agent, Indian Broom and a gallant Don Roberto battling gamely, literally lunged down the track to win.
