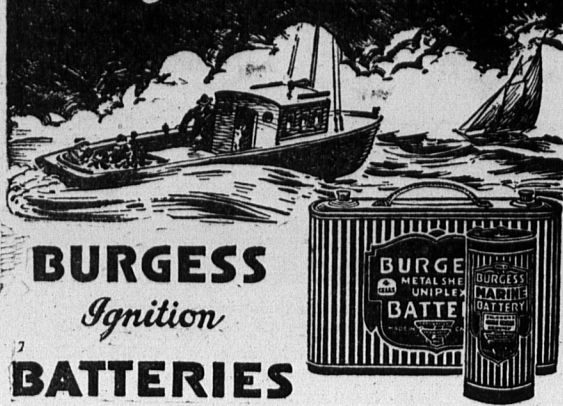

MRS. JOHN OTT

(Asusa, Calif. Herald) Mrs. John Ott, one of Asusa's most dearly beloved pioneer women, passed away at her home on Eleventh Street, Saturday morning, July 1st. Mrs. Ott, the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen MacCallum, was born September 7, 1857, at Brackley Point Road, Prince Edward Island, Canada. She attended the Grammar school at Harrington and later graduated from Prince of Wales College. She taught school for several years in Canada.

In 1887 she came to San Bernardino, where she was met by her fiancée, William Forbes, of Asusa, and formerly of Canada. The young couple were married in San Bernardino and came to Forbes' orange and delicious ranch a few miles south of Asusa, now known as the Hendrick place. For three years the couple lived here until Forbes died very suddenly. Several years later the widow sold the ranch and moved to her orange grove on Eleventh street, where she has since resided.

In February, 1894, she married John Ott at San Bernardino, California. This union was blessed with one son, George V. Ott. In her early teens Mrs. Ott united with the Presbyterian church of Harrington, Canada. In July, 1888, she transferred her membership to the First Presbyterian church of Asusa. She was a charter member of the local church, and of the Ladies' Missionary Society. Several years ago she was given an honorary life membership in the Missionary Society for her fifteen years of faithful and efficient service as its secretary.

Mrs. Ott's chief interest in life was her connection with the church and all of its many activities. Among the many beautiful floral pieces which were sent to the service were those from the Sunday School, the Ladies' Missionary Society, the Friendship Class, the Adult Bible Class and the Church itself.

Mrs. Ott leaves her husband, John Ott; one son, George Ott; two brothers, Dr. H. J. MacCallum of Asusa, and George L. MacCallum of Pennsylvania; five sisters, Mrs. Florence Johnson, Mrs. Janie C. Stewart and Miss Emille MacCallum, all of Long Beach; Mrs. Winifred B. Hanes of Asusa; Mrs. Albert Stuart of San Jose; and three grandchildren, Betty Jean, Doris Louise and Larry Dean.

Funeral services were held at White's Funeral Home on Monday at 2:30 o'clock with the Rev. S. F. Shiffler and the Rev. E. L. Jones conducting the services. Special music was sung by the Presbyterian quartet. Interment was made in Oakdale cemetery. The pallbearers, Mack Vickery, Charles Stewart, Lewis Coles, Hardy Blatchley, Bruce Forbes and Lester Holdeman, were nephews of Mrs. Ott.

Historical Sketch And Obituary

A soft, misty rain scarcely obscuring the sun settled over the harbor of a small port in the Lowlands of Scotland on a certain Spring day in the year 1772 marking the departure of a stately three masted schooner. Besides her cargo she carried as passengers emigrants severing with finality their connection with Scottish homes the heritage of centuries. On this ship was a certain David Anderson with his wife and three small sons. They selected the picturesque headland which to-day marks the village of Murray Harbor, as their choice for a home site, and the family with their Lares and Penates were put ashore in a small boat. Thus was founded the Anderson family of Prince Edward Island, who today have descendants settled over the Dominion from coast to coast.

This sketch has to do with the demise of the last great grand son of the courageous David, who so bravely gathered his belongings in the Old Country and with faith in God and his destiny started in the virgin forest of Isle St. Jean.

This great grand son, Oliver William Anderson, passed peacefully to his rest on May 22nd, at the great age of ninety-five. It suggested a romantic voyage back into the pages of family history and traditions, to spend an afternoon with Oliver listening to his stories. As declining strength prevented him from taking part in the more strenuous farm duties, he gladly welcomed old friends and young who came to visit him. He will long be remembered sitting in his arm-chair telling stories of the past with intelligence and humor most entertaining. His home was the epitome of Island hospitality. His life exemplified robust, sane Christianity. He went to sleep one afternoon in his bedroom overlooking the orchard, at the home of his son, Lloyd, and will awake when the trumpet shall sound to hear the glad words "Come Ye Blessed" from the Master whom he served so unflinchingly.

At his funeral there was a pleasing absence of lamentation; family and relatives seemed to realize that here was the fulfillment of life as designed by nature at the bidding of her Creator. His passing was so peaceful and painless that sons and daughters felt God had so unusually rewarded this faithful servant, that they could say with Cowper "We would not if we could constrain his unbound spirit into bonds again."

His wife, formerly Randall Hayden, daughter of Charles Hayden, M'gill Mills, predeceased him by fifteen years.

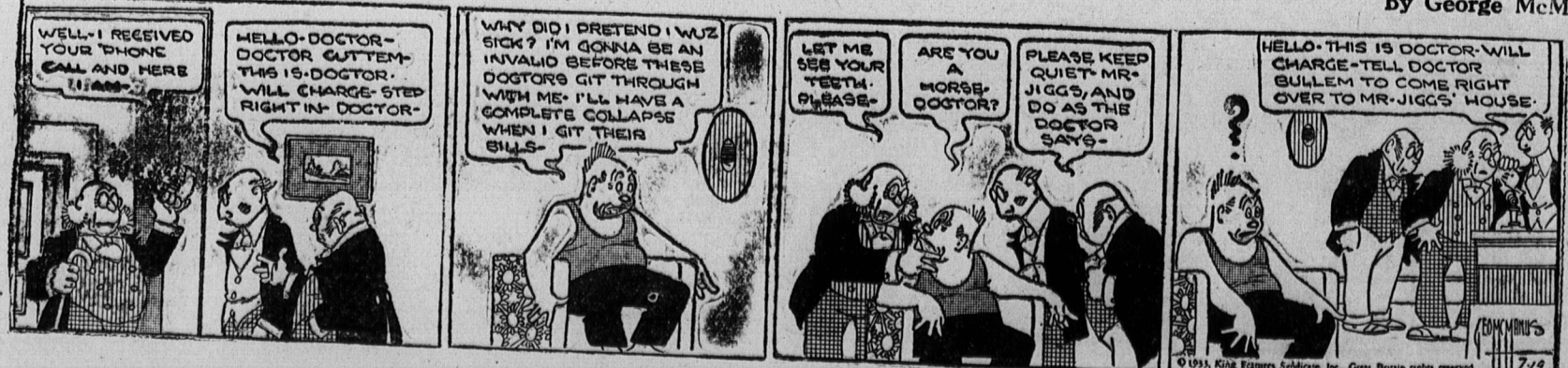
