THE SUMMER STEAMERS.—The s. s. Empress made the round trip on the Summerside-Point du Chene route yesterday as easily as she would make it in summer, arriving in Summerside on return on time. The Northumberland on account of the ice conditions will not be able to move out yet for a while.

FULL MAIL.—There was a full mail received in Charlottetown last night by the express. The Nova Scotia mail was not distributed until late on account of the late arrival of the Stanley. The mail is now collected from the Charlottetown letter boxes in the morning between 3 and 5 o'clock, at noon and in the evening at 6 o'clock.

INDUCTION.—Rev. J. S. McKay was inducted into the pastoral charge of the Tryon, Hampton and Bonshaw congregation yesterday afternoon. At Bonshaw there was a fairly large and representative congregation present. The sermon for the occasion was preached by Rev. Frank Coffin, while the induction ceremony was performed by the Moderator of the congregation, Rev. Alex McKay, of Bebedeque. The address to the pastor was delivered by Rev. G. C. Taylor, of Zion Church and to the people by Rev. Alex McKay. The newly inducted pastor has taken up his residence at the Manse Hampton, and next Sunday will preach at Bonshaw at 11 a.m., Hampton, at 3 and Tryon at 7 p.m.

AMERICAN HORSE MARKETS.

A better tone is reported to be prevailing at Chicago in the horse market. Though prices have not advanced to any extent, still bidding has been better than usual. Considerable fine-boned driving stock was selling at \$75 to \$125 and medium weight farm horses at \$130 to \$150. A decent class of farm mares went at \$140 to \$160 and \$140 to \$180 took chunks of the runner type. Commercial chunks, weighing 1,450 pounds and upwards, are selling at \$190 to \$225, with most of the draft stock at \$235 to \$250.
