Cheers were then given for Mr. Stewart and the Contingent.

Mr. Jas. McIsaac asked the electors present not only to send Mr. Stewart but to aid in the sending of four others to represent the province.

Mr. J. P. Tanton and Mr. M. L. McIlish also delivered pointed addresses and were liberally cheered.

Senator Ferguson was the last speaker and after a review predicted a magnificent victory.

**THE CONFIDENT TORIES**

Cheer W.S. Stewart's Predictions of a Sweeping Victory.

On Thursday 26th of October, Finley (Philip) McFadyen, Canoe Cove, who has been in failing health for some time passed peacefully to his rest. The deceased was a young man in his 18th year but of very exemplary character for that age. Though so young he had almost completed his apprenticeship to his brother as a carriage builder and during his service he had acquired much skill in finer and more artistic woodwork, leaving in many homes evidences of his skill and art. In his social relations he bore even more noble characteristics, an obedient dutiful son, a kind and affectionate brother and a true warm friend he was loved and respected by all. Of a naturally delicate constitution, his early ambition and close application to work gradually undermined his physical health and despite the efforts of medical skill resulted in complete break-down and death. During his sickness he exhibited an example of patience and self denial, moving about his home and performing some light task up to a few days before his death. On Wednesday the day before his death he was attacked by a sinking weakness. He took to his bed and declared to those around him that his earthly days were over. Perfectly conscious he stared death in the face without a tremor, for to him the "sting" was gone and his parting words were but an additional testimony to the assurance of "that immortal glory beyond."

**LIBERAL MEETING**

Last Night's Rally in Market Hall

**CONFIDENT LIBERALS**

Cheer Sir Louis Davies' Predictions of a Sweeping Victory.

The Liberal rally in Market Hall was packed and enthusiastic. Mr. T. Riley presided. On the platform were a number of prominent Liberals.

Mr. Horace Hazard was the first speaker and anticipated the return of Mr. McKinnon in East Queens by 150 majority, Mr. Hughes in Kings by a handsome majority, and four members if not five in the province.

Mr. Welsh, ex-M. P. thought Sir Louis ought to have been returned by acclamation. For the city's credit make his majority a big one.

Premier Farquharson enlivened the Laurier Government and Sir Louis, predicting the latter would have 400 majority in West River where Dr. Douglas had 800.

Dr. H. Johnson, L. E. Prowse, M. L. A. who was cheered to the echo, and Dr. Taylor followed in succession.

Sir Louis Davies received a great ovation from his supporters who cheered and cheered again and again. He invited them to come to Market Hall on election night and celebrate their victory. It looked like victory all along the line. Hon. Fred Peters whom they all knew claimed five Liberals out of six in British Columbia and the Northwest where the Opposition had claimed a clean sweep was now the best Liberal ground. Three weeks ago it was said Sifton was not in it. Today Hugh John is beaten. In Ontario, Sir Richard claimed a majority. In Quebec there are now 50 Liberals out of 65. Mr. Tarte claims five more—but let that go. In Nova Scotia Mr. Fielding says Liberal prospects were never brighter. Sir Charles Tupper fights for his life in Sidney. New Brunswick is conceded to the Liberals. Foster driven out of York, and John Coetigan elected as a Liberal without opposition. Sir Louis concluded with urging all to vote early and work. He claimed he would have 400 majority outside of town and a small majority here.

There were other speakers, and the electors present were in a confident mood, hearing them all and especially Sir Louis enthusiastically.
