**ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST**

The electric light at the foot of Hillsboro Street to which attention was before directed was out again last night. Passengers wending their way to the station in the dark made much complaint.

The induction of Rev. W. H. Smith Pa. D., Summerside, into Pelmouth Street church in Sydney is arranged to take place on Thursday, the 21st, at 7.30 p. m. Rev. Gordon Dickie is to be the preacher for the occasion.

MANY friends will regret to learn that the genial male courier met with a slight accident several days. While moving a horse he slipped breaking a small bone in his ankle. Mr. Stewart hopes to be around again in a short time.

As announced some time since in The Guardian the new firm of McDonald and Perry have opened an up-to-date tailoring establishment in the store formerly occupied by the late L. W. Harris. THOMAS R. BROOKS, who formerly resided on Prince Street opposite Kindergarten Hall, was killed Saturday by falling downstairs at the residence of his daughter Mrs. Joseph Finberg in Attleboro, Mass. In the dark he mistook the cellar door for one leading to a room. Mr. Brooks was 77 years old and is survived by a widow and four daughters. His death is the first in the Brooks family for fifty years.

The winter steamers made good crossings Saturday and the mails reached Charlottetown at 12.05.

The city teachers will wait upon the City Council in a body tonight to urge additional supplements.

A LETTER received by Hon. James W. Richards a few days ago from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, explains that the amount due fishermen and meat dealers for loss sustained during the winter of 1902-3 owing to interruption of navigation, has been placed in the supplementary estimates and, as soon as passed, which it is hoped will be shortly, will be paid to the various claimants. It will be remembered that last autumn, those who had suffered loss on account of the detention of the winter steamers petitioned the winter of Marine and Fisheries for reimbursement. This petition was forwarded by the local government with a strong recommendation that its prayer be granted. Hon. James W. Richards, who was in Ottawa in October, at the request of a number of the petitioners, and as a member of the provincial government, interviewed the Minister on the subject, pressing the claims of the fishermen and dealers. During his stay in Ottawa Mr. Richards had several interviews with the Minister which resulted in the latter agreeing to send an agent of the department to the island to investigate the claims. Accordingly, Mr. Stumbles came and held conferences with the claimants at several points on the island. On his return to Ottawa, Mr. Stumbles submitted his report and the Minister, on the strength of the representations made, recommended the payment of the claims, but the session being over, the amount could not be appropriated. It was therefore necessary to wait for the next session. The amount has, as above stated, been placed in the supplementary estimates and will be forthcoming as soon as the necessary routine will permit.

A. J. Newsom, of this city, desires to state positively in reference to reports that have been circulated about him that he has had no connection in any way with any of the recent Prohibition cases before the Court.

At present there is a particularly large shipment of potatoes being made from Aroostook county and adjoining neighborhood to Boston via Vanceboro. These potatoes are quoted at \$2.50 to \$2.75 per barrel, an exceptionally high price. There are various reasons given for the high price now obtained but the principal one is that labor costs so much. The farmers claim that last fall they had to pay two dollars and fifty cents per day to pick the potatoes after they were dug up by the machine.

The S. E. Restigouche will be placed in commission on the 15th inst. Although chartered to carry a full cargo from Fort Monro, C. B., to Montreal, she will call at Summerside and Charlottetown on the outward trip, if permitted. Some effort should be made to prevail on the Government to have the Minto open the channel to Charlottetown to enable the Restigouche or any other steamer to enter the harbor. The enterprise of the owners of the Restigouche in starting her so early in the season is certainly commendable.

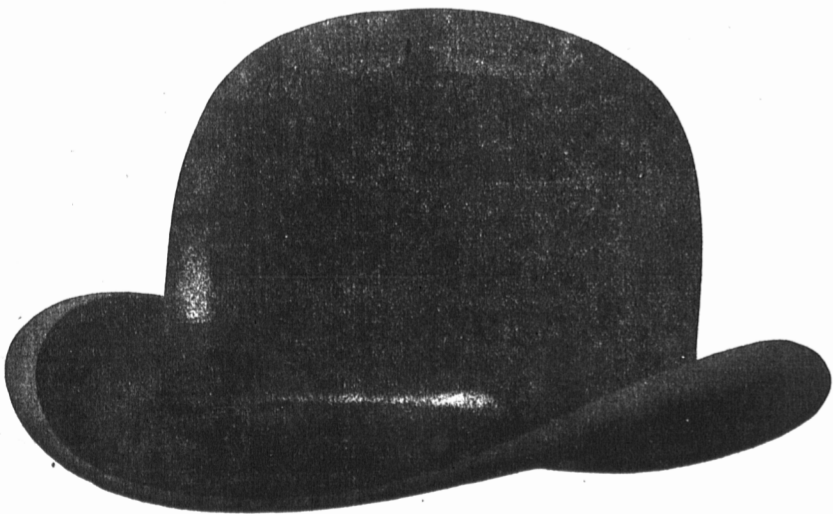
