## CARNEGIE'S EXPLANATION.

We cannot regard Mr. Carnegie's state-  
ment cabled to the Mayor of Sydney as by  
any means satisfactory, although that  
official has accepted it so far as Sydney is  
concerned. Mr. Carnegie says he is sorry  
that his words have given offence, but he  
does not retract or explain them away.  
Rather he has reaffirmed the most offensive  
part of them. He had in his original state-  
ment declared that Canada is a fragment  
and can have no future outside of union  
with the United States. And here is his  
explanation: "My wish is to restore the  
union of North America and Britain, in-  
stead of maintaining two separate divi-  
sions. We would rule the world in peace.  
If you come to Skibo Castle I could convey  
you."

He would "restore the union of  
North America" by annexing Canada  
to the United States and banishing the  
British flag from this continent. This  
much effected there would be such a  
friendly accord established between  
Britain and America that they could rule  
the world in peace. In other words  
Britain should surrender half a continent  
in order to secure the friendship of the  
United States, which we must assume  
cannot be had on any terms less costly.  
And as for the feelings and wishes of the  
Canadian people they are to be left all  
together out of account. All of which is  
quite as insulting as his original  
statement. It is followed by the cheap  
jest as to how quickly he could convert  
the Mayor of Sydney to his views if he  
had him in Skibo Castle. No doubt the  
great man's idea is that a humble Cana-  
dian once brought into touch with the  
Grandeur and magnificence of a castle  
multi-millionaire would at once cease to  
have any views of his own.

Carnegie's explanation serves only to  
accentuate the insult contained in his  
first statement and to reveal the in-  
grained disloyalty of the man. He  
was British born; he changed his al-  
legiance, as he had a right to do if he  
chose. But what he has no right to do  
is to live on British soil and thence enter  
upon a propaganda for alienating the  
loyalty of British subjects and bringing

about the dismemberment of the British  
Empire. No doubt he has undertaken  
what is altogether beyond his power to  
effect, but the motive is apparent. And  
as we before said it quite takes the gloss  
off his ostentatious donations of library  
buildings to Canadian cities when the  
object in view is to be the weaken-  
ing of their allegiance to their own flag  
and government. We understand Mr.  
Carnegie better now than we did at first  
and we must confess that the closer  
acquaintance has not brought with it any  
increase of respect for the master of  
Skibo.

## AGAINST THE LAND BILL.

The general feeling in Canada in regard  
to the Irish Land Bill has been so favor-  
able that it may be of interest to take  
note of what is being said on the other  
side. Among these is a red-hot article  
contributed by Judge O'Connor Morris to  
a publication called The Nineteenth Cen-  
tury and After. This writer characterises  
the bill as an elaborate scheme of ingeni-  
ous but pernicious agrarian quackery;  
proceeding on an utterly immoral  
principle, it is he says, "rank with corrup-  
tion from beginning to end; it will bring to  
Ireland not peace but a sword. While it  
bribes and corrupts the landlords with  
one hand and the purchasing tenants  
with the other at the cost of the general  
taxpayer, it leaves those who continue to  
be tenants at a very unfair disadvantage  
and they will soon begin to repudiate the  
rents. Not only so, but when tenants in  
England and Scotland understand what  
great reductions—sixty per cent in thirty  
years—Irish tenants have received, they  
will demand corresponding reductions."

This line of attack, which pushes  
earnestness to the limit of unrestrained  
vehemence, is not very convincing, and  
may tend rather against than in favor of  
the writer's case. And yet there appears  
to be something of real weight in what he  
says both with regard to the Irish tenants  
who may not buy out their holdings and  
the English and Scotch tenants as well.  
It is too much to expect that all the  
Irish tenantry will care to become pur-  
chasers even under the favorable terms  
proposed by the bill. And it would be  
quite in line with what they have done in  
the past if they push their advantage for  
a further reduction. The bill will certainly  
unsettle existing relations between  
landlords and tenants in Ireland. And  
it is not unreasonable to suppose that it  
may have a disturbing effect upon like  
relations in England and Scotland. In  
any case it is likely to become law. Very  
probably the ultimate result may be  
neither so good as the sanguine promp-  
ters of the bill hope for nor so pernicious  
as its extreme opponents point out. We  
believe it will effect some improvement  
in material conditions and produce  
greater content in Ireland, and such is its  
prime object. It will be most unfortu-  
nate should it cause any widespread dis-  
satisfaction among the tenantry in En-  
gland and Scotland.
