every one who has ever studied the Book. The Bible is God's word. Were it man's, man could understand. The mystery of the Atonement is understood by God; He planned it. The finite mind of man cannot understand it. God does not ask us to; He asks us to believe.

"As to the excuse that there are too many hypocrites in the Church," said Mr. Bell, when Christ began His work, he chose twelve men to help Him and one of them was a hypocrite. If you wait until all the hypocrites are out of the Church, you must wait until the Judgment Day, when God will gather His chosen ones to Himself and sweep the hypocrites into Hell.

If you do not decide for Christ before that time, whether you will it or not you will have to spend eternity with the hypocrites. The Church however, has no monopoly on this class. You will find hypocrites in business, in fraternal societies everywhere. Some say that business interferes with their making a decision for Christ. No legitimate business should interfere with their being a Christian but there is one business you cannot remain in and be a Christian—that is the "booze-business."

STEAMER CURACA HAS BEEN FLOATED

HALIFAX April 23—The steamer Curaca, which was submerged at the entrance of the Basin since the explosion, and was recently raised, was towed down the harbor yesterday afternoon, and is now on the north side of number Four Pier, Deep Water. The steamer is one of the worst wrecks that has ever been seen in Halifax Harbor, and many persons visited the war to see her. The work of towing her down from the Basin occupied several hours and she was put half way into the dock at Pier Four. This morning more water will be pumped out of the steamer and she will be moved further into the dock. Five towboats assisted in towing her down. While the Curaca was in the Basin, four bodies were recovered by the workmen. They were members of the crew and when found were jammed between decks in the after hold. The head of one of the bodies was missing, and the others were so badly mangled that it is almost impossible to recognize them. It was expected that more bodies would be found in the Curaca when she was refloated, but those working on the steamer now think that all the bodies have been found, and that those still missing will never be located.

London Hopes For Relief

LONDON, April 19.—A rumor is in circulation here that the Canadian Power Controller, Sir Henry Drayton, is at last to take action to relieve London's electric famine. The story has it that Sir Henry is to visit Toronto at once to attempt to make an agreement with McKenzie and Mann under which the abandoned customers of the London Electric Company will be taken care of. Today the manufacturers of London met to register a protest against a continuation of present conditions. The City Hydro-Electric Department has been forced to divide the city into eight districts each one of which is cut off during a certain hour each day. Under this scheme certain munition factories, with other industries, are cut off.

WORTH CONSIDERATION

Perhaps some of your cows gave twenty-five pounds of milk yesterday, and some gave twenty-two; the difference of three pounds in the day, a pound and a half in the day, a matter that is easily overlooked. In fact the smaller quantity may appear the larger on account of more foam on top, and might easily pass as the larger or mess if not weighed. But a pound and a half at a milking may amount in a lactation period to a thousand pounds and that is worth consideration.

In the plan of cow testing advocated by the Dairy Division, Ottawa, no man could be a thousand pounds astray in his judgment between two cows, for he would have the weight given by each cow jotted down at the time. Some men weigh three days per month, many prefer to weigh daily, it is better; the two different printed forms are available for free distribution, write and get them, stating which you prefer, the daily or three-day form.
