Calder, Minister of Immigration in the Dominion Cabinet, who arrived here Saturday on the Mauretania, on his way back to the Capital, after an extensive trip of inspection of Canadian Immigration Offices in the Old Country.

Governor General's Mother Dies

VANCOUVER, Sept. 27.—The Duke of Devonshire, Governor-General of Canada, received word on Friday of the death in England of his mother, Lady Emma Cavendish. The Vice Regal party, which arrived here yesterday will not be able to fill all their engagements on the coast as a consequence.

Gradual Decline In Prices

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—A period of stable costs is not expected for several years, Secretary of Treasury Houston declared this afternoon. The Secretary also said that he would not venture to predict that pre-war level prices would be repeated. Such cuts in prices as have been made in two or three quarters are a significant tendency of the present time, he said, during a conversation in which he alluded to the recent price slash by Henry Ford. I believe there will be a gradual recession in prices but that a stable condition will not be reached for several years.

THE PENNANT RACES AT A GLANCE

The Cleveland Indians advanced their lead in the American League yesterday, by a game and a half, when they overcame the White Sox, in Cleveland. They stand 14 in the lead.

Walter Mails' superb hurling saved his team winning his fifth consecutive victory, since signing up with the team. He allowed three hits and struck out six Palmd Hose men. In the fifth inning Mails was in danger but redeemed himself. He struck out Risberg and after this lost control, so that the bases were full "on balls." He, steadied and retired the side "fanning" Weaver and Eddie Collins in succession.

In the National League, Brooklyn and New York rested yesterday, in preparation for to-day's two game series. Brooklyn holds a lead of 32 points over New York. If this team wins two more games the pennant in the National League belongs to the "Superbas."

A forecast places the world's series between Brooklyn and the Cleveland Indians. Tris Speaker's aggregation showed a comeback yesterday. This has apparently "juggled" the right men at the right time. If he can keep on juggling he may juggle a pennant.

Kent Farmers Elect Representatives

REXTON, N. S., Sept. 27.—At one of the most largely attended and representative conventions ever held in the County of Kent, the United Farmers party yesterday afternoon placed in nomination for local legislature in the forthcoming election Dr. D. V. Landry, Col. John Sheridan, Buctouche and Councillor David Roach, Acadville. Every parish of the County was represented by strong delegations, including many former supporters of the Foster government who are seeing their mistake in rejecting Dr. Landry his colleague of 1917 and are now out of work their hardest until the last vote is polled in order to elect the ticket chosen.

RECORDS FOR FASTING

The human body, according to medical authorities, when entirely deprived of nutriment, is ordinarily capable of supporting life for little more than a week. Mr. Terence MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, has already passed twenty days without food, but he seems to have prolonged his life by an occasional drink of water. The value of even a little water was shown in the disaster at the Tynnewd mine, near Perth in South Wales, 1871, when four men and boys who had been entombed for ten days without food were able to walk when released. The thorough saturation of their narrow space with aqueous vapor and the presence of drain water in the cuttings were their chief preservative. At the wreck of the Medusa frigate in 1876 fifteen people survived on a raft for thirteen days without food. Various people have tried, generally for exhibition purposes, how long they could fast from food, with the aid of water or some medical preparation. In this way for thirty days in 1888 a man named Jacques fasted and in London for forty-two days in 1890, and again for fifty days in 1891, and an Italian named Succo for forty days in 1890. Dr. Tanner's experiment in New York, in 1880, arose out of the claim of Mollie Francher of Brooklyn that she had lived fourteen days without food. Dr. William A. Hammond offered her \$1,000 if she would refrain from food and allow herself to be watched for one month by relay of Doctors of the New York Neurological Society. Tanner, at that time, a practising physician in Minneapolis, offered to take up the challenge, and Dr. Hammond agreed, saying: "If he succeeds he will get \$1,000, and if he dies I will give him a decent burial." Dr. Tanner, who was fifty years of age, began his fast at noon on June 28, 1880, and finished on August 7, a total of forty days.
