Before leaving home he was waded upon by several of the young folks of Lorne Valley, Cardigan, with an address and presentation. We wish Mr. Bowen bon voyage. A sad and fatal accident occurred at Myrtle Wharf, Charlottetown, on Saturday, April 14th, when William Sweeney of East Boston, formerly of North Cardigan was killed. He was the eldest son and only support of his mother, and four small children. His funeral was largely attended, and the flowers sent were beautiful especially a design containing twenty-four white roses, representing the years of his life, sent by his employers, the Boston and Maine Railroad, by whom he was greatly valued. The sympathy of many friends goes out to his mother and to his brothers and sisters in their bereavement. On Friday evening last Washington Young and Seldon McLean were coming ashore from their trawls off Melville Cove a short distance west from Basin Head. Their dory capsized on the bar. Young told Seldon to hold on to the dory, and that was the last he saw or heard of him. Seldon hung with a death grip to the gunwale of the overturned dory, while Wilfred and Hedley McLean who saw the accident from the shore launched another dory with all speed and hastened to the rescue. They saved Seldon in a thoroughly exhausted condition but no sign of Young was to be seen. Next morning his body was picked up on the point west from Basin Head. He leaves a sorrowing mother, two brothers, and a sister. He sailed the Western Atlantic for many years, fished in the Grand Banks out of Gloucester and was drowned at last just at his own door. The Guardian's correspondent from the East reports—Rev. Mr. Gardner and Mrs. Gardner are enjoying a visit from their son Harold, wife and family. John T. Whelan has gone on a visit to Boston. Peter Mellick has returned to Boston after a few weeks' visit to his mother and friends. He was accompanied by Miss Ada Fraser and Gordon Stewart. It will be noticed that while the exodus from the other countries is now largely to the plains of the West and the South of the Pacific north of the 40th parallel our young people still flock to Boston where relatives and friends are generally found, and where in anticipation little work, magnificent wages and business' in profession are always procurable. John Robertson caught the first codfish of the season at Basin Head on the 26th and now trawls are set and baited in all directions. There are more trawls and more fishermen on our waters this spring than ever, and their success means much to the country. Mrs. Silas S. Robertson of Kingsboro, acknowledges with heartfelt thanks the touching evidence of sympathy extended towards her during her recent sad bereavement, the sudden and unexpected death of a loving sister, Mrs. Lively, of Boston—James Lett is confined to his home with illness. T. S. Robertson is slowly improving.
