Mrs. Harry Tweedy, Earncliffe, has returned home from an enjoyable visit with friends in Vernon River and the city.

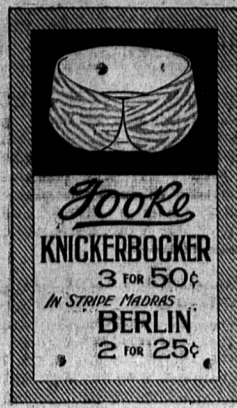
Mrs. John A. McInnis, Earncliffe, is slowly recovering from the results of the severe injury she received recently.

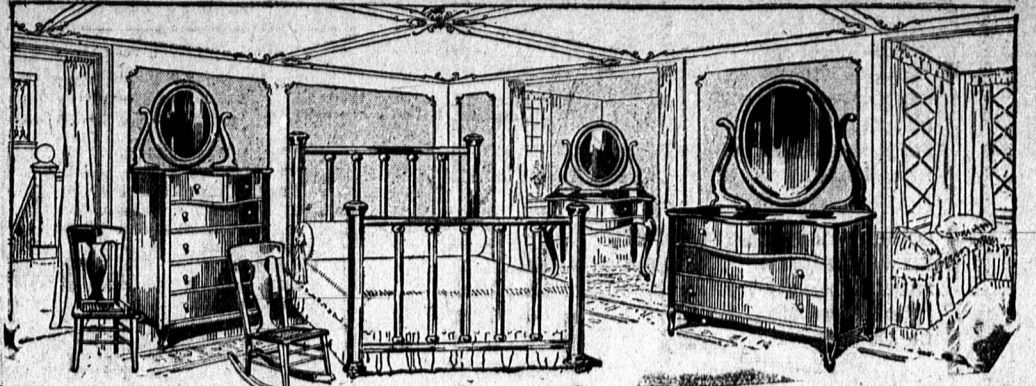
Card of Thanks

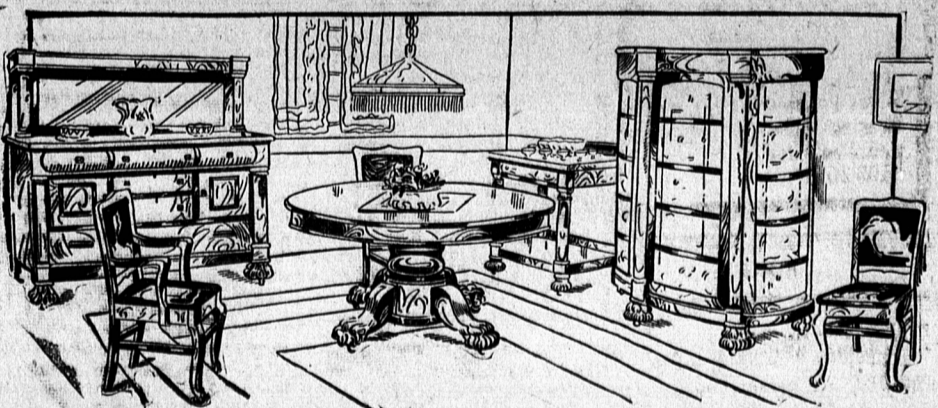
