Nation's Leaders Join With Sorrowing Citizens In Last Tribute to Late Defence Minister



Military and civilian leaders of the nation, with the rank and file of the armed forces and citizens of Canada's capital, united, June 12, to do final honor to the late Hon. Norman Rogers, minister of defence, who met death in an airplane crash on his way to Toronto. In a flag-draped casket the body lay in state in the Hall of Fame in Ottawa's parliament man Rogers, with officers of the three services stand guard.
